SUBJECT: Difficulties Encountered with "Roswell" Book

When I received the latest version of the manuscript from Air Force Graphics on 14 Feb, I discovered numerous errors that will require correction before publication. These errors included unauthorized changes, violations of the Privacy Act, numerous instances of non-compliance with SAF/AAZD requests (including a large error on the cover) and non-compliance with SAF/PAS and SAF/GC directives. There was also a reluctance by Mr Bell, Chief of Air Force Graphics, to allow me to review the final draft before submission to Air Force Publishing. Mr Bell only allowed this review when directed by Col Haynes of SAF/AAZD. **This version of the manuscript is unfit for publication and potentially damaging to the Air Force.** The changes necessary for publication are summarized in Attachment 1.

In addition to errors regarding the Privacy Act and SAF/PAS and SAF/GC directives, the unauthorized change was the removal of two individuals names and the substitution of other text in the acknowledgments section. The correct and substituted acknowledgments are contained in Attachment 2. When I assembled the acknowledgments section, I took great care to recognize only those individuals who I believed supported and contributed to this book. These two persons had large input and deserved every word of their acknowledgments. I cannot recognize the entire staff of Headquarters Air Force Media Services and Graphics, as indicated in the substituted text because the entire staff did not work on this book. Additionally, I consulted numerous Air Force publications, primarily *With Courage, The U.S. Army Air Forces in World War II*, to see how other Air Force authors acknowledged Headquarters Air Force Media Services and Graphics personnel. In this book, written by AF/HO and prepared for publication by Air Force Graphics in 1994, I noticed by name acknowledgments of two Air Force Graphics civilians (page viii). There was no mention of their organization. The original acknowledgment is measured, appropriate and is similar to those of other Air Force authors.

If I had not acquired a copy of the manuscript, inaccuracies, violations of the Privacy Act, and sections of the book not in compliance with SAF/PAS and SAF/GC directives would have been published.

It is important that the standard practice of allowing the author to review a final draft before submission for publication be observed to prevent a reoccurrence of this kind of potentially damaging action.

The majority of these changes were obvious and should have been identified internally and corrected by Graphics prior to the return of the draft to SAF/AAZD. **Total time to correct these discrepancies is approximately 1 hour.** Other possible discrepancies were also noted. Many of the images in the draft provided to SAF/AAZD on 14 Feb that in previous drafts appeared clear and of proper tone, appeared to be dark and blurry in this draft.



UPDATE-ROSWELL II

The final report regarding the "Roswell Incident" is presently being drafted and is approximately 75 per cent complete. The final draft, contingent upon coordination with Air Force Graphics, will be completed on 25 Aug. Findings are supplemental and do not contradict the July 1994 report to the Secretary of the Air Force. The July 1994 report described one portion of the "Roswell Incident", this supplemental report describes other USAF activities that have been combined with that event to create the "Roswell Incident". Findings are as follows:

- The reported of the "bodies" have been identified, with a high degree of certainty, as anthropomorphic test dummies that were launched on high altitude balloons from Holloman AFB, NM from 1954 to 1959. Many of the abstractly human dummies, used to record high altitude parachute performance data, were recovered at off range locations in the Roswell, NM area. Photographs, test reports, and interviews with Air Force participants have been obtained (TAB 1).
- Air Force high altitude balloon recovery crews, routinely operating in the Roswell area from 1947 to the present, have been identified as the Air Force activity that civilian observers believe was involved in the recovery of a "flying saucer". Techniques and equipment employed by the crews, when compared with "eyewitness" accounts, leaves little doubt that balloon recoveries were described. The majority of the approximately 2000 flights launched from Holloman, were unclassified scientific research. Local residents often assisted in recovery operations and were paid a twenty-five dollar finder's fee by Holloman AFB. Interviews, photographs and technical reports have been obtained (TAB 2).
- Reports of "aliens" at the hospital at Roswell Army Airfield/ Walker AFB, NM, is likely two separate incidents. The first incident has been identified as the recovery/processing of crash victims from a 1957 KC-97 accident in which 16 Air Force members were killed. The second was manned balloon accident in which one of the Air Force pilots was injured. The injuries to the pilot included a hematoma to the forehead that resulted in extensive swelling. Photographs of the injured pilot bear striking resemblance to drawings of "aliens" with oversized heads. Interviews have been conducted and photographs obtained of this incident.
- Additional "flying saucer" accounts in the Roswell area are attributable to joint JSAF/NASA test operations of interplanetary space probes launched by high altitude balloon om Walker AFB, NM, in the 1960s and 1970s. (TAB 3).

No findings indicate that any of these operations violated either USAF regulations or that USAF personnel engaged in otherwise unlawful activities. It appears that routine USAF activities have been misinterpreted to create a sensational story.



SUBJECT: Roswell Update

- 1. In early December 1994, while searching for photographs at the National Archives for the Air Force History publication on Roswell, information was uncovered that appears to explain many of the accounts of "alien" bodies described by UFO writers. The report by SAF/AAZ in July 1994 did not address the issue of alien bodies since no information had been located at that time. One of the main criticisms of the report made by the press and the UFO community is that it did not account for the "bodies".
- 2. It appears that UFO writers have combined many different events starting with the Mogul incident, a formerly Top Secret project explained in depth by the July 1994 report, and some unrelated Air Force research activities from the 1950's and 60's. The writers claim these events all occurred on one or two days in 1947. Many of the descriptions of alien bodies are actually descriptions of amophomorphic dummies used for parachute, ejection seat, and possibly space capsule testing (Atch 1). It is also possible that witnesses described chimpanzees or chimpanzeelike dummies (known as chimpamorphic dummies) launched for scientific purposes. Additionally, one of the cornerstones of the UFO writer's scenario is the testimony of a private citizen Mr Glenn Dennis. Mr. Dennis described a peculiar occurrence involving alien bodies at the base hospital at Roswell Army Airfield in July 1947 (Atch 2). Research has shown the story the witness relates actually occurred in about 1960 and didn't involve aliens, but a manned balloon accident. Col Dan Fulgham along with Col Joe Kittenger and Lt Col Bill Kaufman experienced a balloon accident near Walker AFB (formerly Roswell Army Airfield) and were transported for medical treatment to the hospital at Walker. Col Fulgham suffered a hematoma on his scalp and his head swelled considerably. Many of the details related by Mr Dennis are too similar to the balloon accident for it to be a coincidence. All three participants (Kittenger, Fulgham, Kaufman) have been contacted and each remember the incident; LtCol Kaufman has written about the accident in a scientific journal and the on scene medical technician, Hap Lutz, CMSgt (ret), has also written about it.
- 3. Col Kittenger, I believe, is the red haired captain described in Attachment 2. Descriptions of the red haired captain appear in most UFO books and is a central figure in the conspiracy theories. The red haired captain always appears after a UFO "crash" to direct the recovery of the spaceship it's alien crew and to threaten civilian witnesses. Col Kittenger, when contacted recently, stated he believes the passages in UFO books describe his own activities when he went into the field to recover research projects. Col Kittenger made no threats. The research projects were launched by balloon, usually carried the amophomorphic dummies, and often landed off of White Sands Missile Range at locations near Roswell, NM. A search is currently underway to locate the records of these launches. Col Kittenger is quite famous for his record setting parachute jump from a balloon at 102,000 ft and he was the first person to cross the Atlantic by balloon. Col Kittenger is credited with an aerial victory in Vietnam and also spent one year in captivity in North Vietnam.

4. I have arranged an interview with Col Dan Fulgham on Jan 24, 1995 at the Pentagon. Col Fulgham flew fighters with Mr Robert McCormick, SAF/AA (ret), in Korea. A possible tie in to the "Roswell Incident" concerns a Captain Robert Dennis who may also have flown fighters in Korea with both Col Fulgham and Mr McCormick. The witness to the hospital story, Glenn Dennis, tells a story where the red haired captain makes threatening remarks directed at his brother, an Air Force fighter pilot named Robert Dennis. At this point I'm not sure how this all relates. My trip to St Louis this week will hopefully shed some light on this complicated subject.

SUBJECT: Status Report on Supplemental Roswell Research

The purpose of this additional project was to tie together the mythology surrounding this event as it relates to one or more discrete Air Force activities in the region which could be interpreted to lend credence to the Roswell story.

The issues to be resolved were:

- 1.) the bodies
- 2.) the spacecraft
- 3.) the presence of Air Force personnel on recovery operations in the vicinity of the "crash".
- 4.) an explanation of coffins and body bags observed in connection with Air Force activities. Additionally, explanation of an autopsy allegedly performed at Walker AFB, NM, and observed by a local mortician, needed to be confirmed.
- establishment of a time frame for each and all of the various explanations, all of which must be supported by documentation (including interviews, where obtainable).

These issues were not fully accounted for in the initial response to the GAO inquiry, principally because they could not be linked to the July 1947 time frame. Now we are in a position to identify various projects, most never classified, which were misinterpreted by unsophisticated observers and became part of the UFO mythology. Release of this information in a complete and finished format will be a public relations benefit and provide a definitive FOIA response for future inquiries into the issue.

PROGRESS TO DATE:

- 1. A solid explanation for the "bodies" has been identified. The information gathered has been written up in essentially final form. The figures, graphics and supporting data are also essentially in final form.
- 2. The "craft" may also be explained as one or more research vehicles, depending on the time frame chosen. The most prominent candidates have been identified and their supporting information is also in final form.
- 3. The various Air Force activities in the vicinity of Roswell AAF and Walker AFB have also been researched, identified and written descriptions, along with extensive graphic support, have been obtained and are incorporated in the final report.

- 4. The coffins and body bag issue can be explained through both documents and photographic support showing research activities which were the most logical source of this aspect of the incident. An autopsy (an unusual event in itself) being observed at Walker AFB, and the alleged controversy surrounding it, stems from several different events and the necessary documentary support is available, with the exception of an autopsy protocol report which has been identified. The protocol needs to be reviewed, most probably at the records repository, if arrangements can't be made to ship it here. The witnesses and military members necessary to verify the events, along with their current status (alive, dead, retired, etc.) has been determined and this area is essentially in final form.
- 5. An overarching time frame has been established which shows that the "incident" is most likely the conglomeration of events which occurred over a period exceeding a decade and, when examined individually, provide an explanation for one or more of the aspects of the "Roswell Incident".

WHAT REMAINS TO BE DONE:

- 1. A review of an autopsy protocol which may match the description of an event which was unusual even for its time. The mystery witness to this event has also been identified with some certainty, but no confirmation has been sought to date because of privacy issues (mainly court martial records, which are being forwarded by the Staff Judge Advocate) as well as personnel and medical files individuals still living. (estimated completion time: Autopsy review-3 days off-site. Personnel records/medical records -- 3 days).
- 2. Anecdotal evidence and detailed descriptions of a series of major early space research projects needs to be finalized; probably within 2 weeks. The first half of the final study is complete and will be returned with comments within 10 days.
- 3. Footnoting and graphics (pictures, etc.) are in the process of being copied and prepared as "camera-ready" for publication. (Estimated completion time: Approximately 3 weeks for each submission-1st half is in process now).
 - 4. Final internal (AAZD) review will consume 10 workdays.

The process has taken longer than originally anticipated, but our perception has been that any publication regarding this issue needs to be fully researched, documented and presented in a clear logical progression which will reduce opportunities for challenge to a minimum level. An alternative is to end the document with an undertaking to investigate further claims to the extent that they cannot be explained by the volume of information amassed to date. The intent is to present the findings in a monograph form (which requires a more detailed footnoting process) but to have it ready for release instead

of preparing the work and then entering the publication process which will add nearly a year as it did for the first report.

In summary, the final report is approximately 50% finalized, the second half is 75% complete with the following open items:

- 1. Identification and interview of the "mystery" nurse(s), along with a review of personnel and medical records.
- Court martial records which may contain relevant testimony by one of the "mystery" nurses.
- 3. Autopsy reports. These are on order, but the location for their review is still in question.

The summary report will also contain three appendices:

- 1. Balloon history. (Completed)
- 2. High altitude research projects (nearly complete).
- 3. The role and history of dummies in research projects (nearly complete).

All of the foregoing is conditioned on three basic assumptions. The first is there are no new developments or programs having a bearing on the issue. Secondly, there will be timely turnaround on information requests made, and thirdly, timely graphics support for the final product which seems to be assured.







The final report regarding the "Roswell Incident" is presently being drafted and is approximately 75 per cent complete. The final draft, contingent upon coordination with Air Force Graphics, will be completed on 25 Aug. Findings are supplemental and do not contradict the July 1994 report to the Secretary of the Air Force. The July 1994 report described one portion of the "Roswell Incident", this supplemental report describes other USAF activities that have been combined with that event to create the "Roswell Incident". Findings are as follows:

- The reported "bodies" have been identified, with a high degree of certainty, as anthropomorphic test dummies that were launched on high altitude balloons from Holloman AFB, NM from 1954 to 1959. Many of the abstractly human dummies, used to record high altitude parachute performance data, were recovered at off range locations in the Roswell, NM area. Photographs, test reports, and interviews with Air Force participants have been obtained (TAB 1).
- Air Force high altitude balloon recovery crews, routinely operating in the Roswell area from 1947 to the present, have been identified as the Air Force activity that civilian observers believe was involved in the recovery of a "flying saucer". Techniques and equipment employed by the crews, when compared with "eyewitness" accounts, leaves little doubt that balloon recoveries were described. The majority of the approximately 2000 flights launched from Holloman, were unclassified scientific research. Local residents often assisted in recovery operations and were paid a twenty-five dollar finder's fee by Holloman AFB. Interviews, photographs and technical reports have been obtained (TAB 2).
- Reports of "aliens" at the hospital at Roswell Army Airfield/ Walker AFB, NM, is likely two separate incidents. The first incident has been identified as the recovery/processing of crash victims from a 1957 KC-97 accident in which 16 Air Force members were killed. The second was a 1959 manned balloon accident in which one of the Air Force pilots was injured. The injuries to the pilot included a hematoma to the forehead that resulted in extensive swelling. Photographs of the injured pilot bear striking resemblance to drawings of "aliens" with oversized heads. Interviews have been conducted and photographs obtained of this incident.
- •Additional "flying saucer" accounts in the Roswell area are attributable to joint USAF/NASA test operations of interplanetary space probes launched by high altitude balloon from Walker AFB, NM, in the 1960s and 1970s. (TAB 3).

No findings indicate that any of these operations violated either USAF regulations or that USAF personnel engaged in otherwise unlawful activities. It appears that routine USAF activities have been misinterpreted to create a sensational story.

Based on the letter from Neil A. Coddington, Lt Col, USAF (Ret) the following research was conducted.

- The organizational history of the unit identified in the orders provided by Lt Col Coddington has been reviewed. It does not contain much useful information about the unit.
- The two other Air Force members identified in the orders personnel files have been located and reviewed at the National Personnel Records Center in ST Louis, MO.
- The two other Air Force members are both retired from the Air Force and their current addresses are available.
- A former AF/IN historian has been contacted and has provided useful information. He is contacting another former historian for additional information.

Interim Findings

It appears that Lt Col Coddington was interviewed by the CIA for a position that required someone with his AFSC (Airborne Radio Repairman), although the exact nature of the assignment is unclear. One of the other radio repairmen listed on the orders was assigned to a Special Activities Squadron in Las Vegas, NV one year later. Speculation is that due to the location and AFSC this person was involved in the development of the SR-71 aircraft, which was a CIA program at that time. Hopefully the other historian can assist in this area.

Findings:

This trip was successful in that two interviews were conducted and sources were checked to verify previous findings. The interviews were of a former Air Force pediatrician and a pharmacist stationed at Walker AFB in the 1950s. References to the pediatrician have surfaced in the Roswell story much to the individual's surprise. The pediatrician had no knowledge of the events he is alleged to have participated nor did he know the person making the claims and attributing statements to him. The pharmacist was interviewed to support aspects of the pediatricians statements.

The newspapers and local history books from various New Mexico cities were checked to verify information obtained from unit histories. The significant finding from this source was the discovery of an additional aircraft crash that may have played a role in the reports of the "bodies" at the Walker AFB hospital. To eliminate/include this information, Col Smith is in the process of obtaining the accident report from Maxwell/HRA.

The public records were reviewed from the areas surrounding Roswell, NM and the White Sands Missile Range. This review was to determine if any judgments (property loss etc.), were recorded due to Air Force activities. This review was negative.

The New Mexico Archives review was also negative.

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Item 8. SYNOPSIS

The Roswell Report: Fact vs. Fiction in the New Mexico Desert, released in July 1994, was a comprehensive report which revealed the controversial 1947 Roswell "flying disc" UFO to be debris from a balloon radar target. Soon afterwards, additional research uncovered information which MAY explain the claims of "alien bodies" at the Roswell debris site. This new information prompted a supplementary research effort, resulting in an addendum to the original 1994 report. This video summarizes the conclusions contained in the addendum, describing some of the scientific and medical experiments which transpired during the 1940s and 1950s using high-altitude research balloons.

Roswell Questions

1. Written By:

- A1. The Secretary of the Air Force Declassification and Review Team (SAF/AAZD), The Pentagon. The primary writer and researcher was Captain James McAndrew.
 - Why SAF/AAZD? SAF/AAZD is the very experienced in the area of
 historical research. Previous projects were declassification and review of
 Southeast Asia POW/MIA records (1989-1993) and the *Gulf War Air Power*Survey (1993). In July 1996 SAF/AAZD received the coveted "Hammer
 Award" from Vice President Gore for excellence in government.

Q2. Authorized by:

- A2. The Secretary of the Air Force.
- Q3. Is it classified?
- **A3.** No.

Q4. How much of this information had to be declassified?

A4. None. This is the irony. Many of the persons interested in this case were convinced that the solution was a secret of some sort. They looked in the wrong places—classified holdings—when the solution was unclassified and available to them all the time.

Q5. How long did it take?

- A5. It took 14 months to research and write the report.
 - Why did it take so long?

Research of any type involving events that occurred nearly 50 years ago requires an extensive amount of archival research which is extremely tedious and time consuming. It was remarkable that Air Force researchers were able to get to the facts at all.

Q6. How much did it cost?

A6. There wasn't any money budgeted for this project. All aspects of production were accomplished in house by Air Force personnel. Approximate costs were \$60,000 for writing and researching and \$55,000 to prepare and then publish it (essentially the cost of labor).

Q7. Was there any political pressure to publish or not publish this information?

A7. No. Air Force scientific projects and descriptions of killed or injured Air Force members were being misrepresented. This was wrong and the facts needed to be presented.

Q8. Why is the Air Force investigating UFOs?

- A8. This wasn't about UFOs. This was a specific response to events that allegedly happened near Roswell, NM.
 - Our research was initiated in 1994 by a request by the General Accounting Office (GAO) for Rep. Steven Schiff (NM). It is mandatory that the Air Force comply with GAO requests. We released our initial findings in September 1994.

 Subsequent to the 1994 report, research revealed that popular accounts included events that occurred over a many year period, they were: 1) historic Air Force scientific balloon projects, and 2) Air Force members killed or injured in the line of duty. This is wrong and it required a response.

- Q9. Why were there two reports? How come all of the information wasn't in the first report?
- A9. The **first report**, released in September 1994, was a specific answer to a specific request from the GAO—what happened near Roswell in July 1947? The GAO's questions were fully researched and answered in this report.

The **second report** was authorized when Air Force researchers realized that historic Air Force scientific projects and descriptions of Air Force members killed or injured in the line of duty that occurred over a many year period were being *misrepresented* as part of this "incident." This is wrong and it required a response.

Q10. So the Air Force did a poor job on the first report.

A10. Not at all. The first report answered the questions posed by GAO. It was remarkable that Air Force researchers were able to find the solution to this perceived mystery at all.

Q11. How come UFO researchers missed this information?

All. I can't speak for them. But our research is documented.

Q12. The events described in the second report didn't even happen in 1947. Is this just more cover-up?

A12. Absolutely not. The persons making the allegations weren't even sure of the date.

This is documented in the report. It is a common pitfall of historical research based solely on anecdotal information—to confuse or combine dates of events. This is why our report has nearly 500 source citations, more than 100 photographs, and even film footage to support it.

- Q13. In 1947 the Air Force said it was a balloon, in 1994 the Air Force said it was a Top Secret Project named MOGUL, and now your saying it is something else.

 What is it?
- A13. It was all of those things. The persons making the allegations weren't even sure of what they saw or when they saw it. This is documented in the report. It is a common pitfall of historical research based solely on anecdotal information, as this case is, to confuse events and combine the dates.
 - I don't buy it! I think the Air Force is trying to confuse people with all this information. On the contrary, this is why our report has nearly 500 source citations, more than 100 photographs, and even film footage to support it. It did not rely on anecdotal claims it relied on documentation.

Q14. What were your sources of information?

Q14. All sources of information are carefully documented in the report according to academic standards. As discussed in the report, the sources were official records, technical reports, film footage, photographs, mass distribution magazines (*Time, Life, National Geographic*, ect.), contemporary newspaper accounts, and interviews with individuals who were involved in the events—all carefully documented.

Q15. Where was this information found?

A15. Within unclassified, and publicly accessible, holdings of the National Archives, Federal Records Centers, official Air Force histories, and public libraries.

Q16. Is this the Air Force's final word on "The Roswell Incident?"

A16. Yes.

Q17. How did you make the connection between the Air Force research balloon programs of the 1950s and the 1947 Roswell Incident?

A17. The whole "Roswell" case is based on an oral tradition. There isn't now, nor was there ever, any physical evidence. When the anecdotal accounts of the witnesses were examined—not the explanations assigned to the accounts by UFO writers—it was clear that these persons had their dates mixed up.

Q18. What is the Air Force still hiding about the Roswell Incident?

A18. Nothing. Read the report and look at the evidence. If you're not convinced, we encourage you to check the nearly 500 source citations yourself.

Q19. How do you respond to the assertion: "This is just more of the cover-up"?

A19. This is expected; we are not trying to convince anyone. Compare our documented research to the UFO claims and decide for yourself.

Q20. If what you say is true, how do you think the Roswell story evolved to its present state?

A20. The story keeps changing; that's how it stays alive; when one aspect is proven false, another "revelation" is injected to keep it going. (Example: changes in sworn testimony, forged and altered Air Force documents, hoaxed films). We anticipate that other sensational claims will be made in the future.

This morning I was contacted by Mr Hatzakos of Air Force TV and he informed me that he was contacted by Maj Kodlick of SAF/PAS. Mr Hatzakos said Maj Kodlick instructed him to destroy all copies of the full length Roswell briefing tape. I do not believe this is a prudent course of action and would strongly advise against it. Destroying all copies of a completed and fully authorized production would only add to speculation of an alleged "cover-up" of information which is not true. The video is simply a summary of the completed Roswell book has been cleared by SAF/PAS, SAF/GC, and AF/JAG (documentation available) for public release. Actions such as this may lead to a violation of the Freedom of Information Act, charges of fraud, waste, and abuse and could have serious legal repercussions.





SUBJECT: Analysis of Purported "Majestic 12 - Group Special Operations Manual" (U)

- (U) We have reviewed the 21 page document you provided entitled "SOMI-01, Extraterrestrial Entities and Technology, Recovery and Disposal," April 1954, purported to be from the "Majestic 12 Group." It is our opinion, for the reasons cited below, that this document is bogus.
- (U) This document claims to be for use by "Majestic 12" units which allegedly report directly to the President. The physical form this "manual" takes, however, is of a U.S. Army field manual, right down to the War Department seal on the cover (even though the War Department went away in 1948 with the formation of the Defense Department, the Army did continue to use that seal for years on its publications). It would be unusual for an "Intelligence Group directly responsible only to the President of the Untied States" (page two) to be organizationally bound through the Army. Additionally, the wording on page two confuses organizational affiliation even more, by seeming to imply that the Air Force has been the agency responsible for recovering alien technology. The "manual" does not further clarify or deconflict this organizational confusion.
- (U) Although the format of the document appears to be a reasonably good copy of an Army field manual, the text is written in such a manner to indicate that it was not composed by a government writer; certainly not quality-controlled; and does not cover in detail much of anything other than restating as "fact" most of the myths perpetuated by UFO buffs for years. Overall, the wording of the entire document is stilted, excessively verbose, and does not conform to government writing style. More importantly, however, the document is shallow and does not explain anything in detail (other than the section on packing and crating). For example, it mentions the "establishment and administration of Special Teams," (page three) without defining exactly what these teams are, of whom they are composed, and how they are equipped or deployed. The same non-discussion goes for "MJ-12 Red Teams" and "OPNAC Teams." Such glaring omissions would not be present in a real publication.



- (U) There are also major format anomalies with the document. The first, is the pagination method used. The narrative appears only on the right hand side of the book, while the left hand side only repeats the same large "warning" notice. This does not conform to any government style before, during, or after the 1954 period. Secondly, although the book is made to appear to have been printed, the "extraterrestrial craft" depicted in figure 4 are obviously hand drawn (and not very well at that) and not printed, as evidenced by poor line quality and density as opposed to the accompanying text. Third, even though this purports to be a printed manual, it is not bound as real printed manuals are, but put together with an "Ecko" fastener. The latter can be explained by the fact that anyone with a Macintosh or similar computer can create a print shop appearing document, but it takes a book binder to bind books not exactly a do it yourself type process.
- (U) There are also two security anomalies worth noting. The first appears on the cover, which purports to be "TOP SECRET/MAJIC EYES ONLY." TOP SECRET, of course, is the highest level of classification and "MAJIC" would be a code word to insure handling within a special compartment. However, this document is also marked "RESTRICTED." This is a significant error. A document could be correctly marked (in addition to TOP SECRET) as "RESTRICTED DATA" (RD) if it contained Atomic Energy information as defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2014) or its predecessor, the Atomic Energy Act of 1946 (42 U.S.C. 1810); however this "manual" contains no such Atomic Energy information therein, as well as also missing the word "DATA" after "RESTRICTED." There was at one time, however, a security classification level below "CONFIDENTIAL" called "RESTRICTED." This level was in effect from 24 Sep 51 - 15 Dec 53. Therefore, the markings on this particular document meant that someone classified the "manual" both at the highest "TOP SECRET" level and at the lowest "RESTRICTED" level. Such a mistake would never happen in reality, notwithstanding there was no "RESTRICTED" in 1954. The second security faux pas occurs on page two wherein it states that everything relating to MI-12 "carries a security level 2 points above that of TOP SECRET." This verbiage reiterates the standard civilian misperception that there is something "above TOP SECRET" (in this case, times two). TOP SECRET was and remains the highest level of classification. While there are compartments and channels that further limit access by use of codeword or nickname (in this case, "MAJIC"), there are no levels above TOP SECRET. This is elementary to security personnel but confusing to outsiders. It further indicates, however, that the person(s) who wrote the document did not know about government security practices.
- (U) The above notwithstanding, the most important errors in the purported "manual" are both technical and factual and serve to prove the "manual" was not produced by the government (at any time) or anyone else in April 1954. The first of these technical issues appears on page five wherein it notes that "Air Force radar reports indicate they (fuselage or cigar shaped craft) are approximately 2 thousand feet long and 95 feet thick." Radar (and particularly the relatively primitive 1954 version) could not determine such exact size of an object by its return other than giving a general relational size (i.e. a fighter usually has a relatively smaller return than a bomber). To say that 1954 radar could determine that something was "95 feet thick" is ludicrous and technologically impossible. Likewise, the same comments go for the "airfoil or triangular shape" craft also described on page five as "... radar indicates an isosceles triangle profile, the longest side being nearly 300 feet in length." Likewise, the 1954 vintage radar also had no capability to determine shape.



(U) A second glaring technological and historical error appears on page eight under the "deceptive statements" subsection, wherein it states "it may become necessary to issue false statements to preserve the security of the site. Meteors, downed satellites, weather balloons ..." etc. Obviously the author(s) forgot that in 1954 there were no satellites in existence. The first Russian Sputnik satellite was not launched until 1957, followed by a U.S. satellite in 1958. In those early years a "downed satellite" was itself a media event that drew public attention - hardly the thing to use as a cover story - notwithstanding that the "manual" was allegedly "written" over three years before there were satellites.

(U) The exact rationale of the authors to create this bogus document is unknown. One could speculate that it is in a desperate attempt to add legitimacy to the original 1987 vintage forgery of the "Briefing Document Majestic-12," which all but the hardest hard core UFO buffs consider to be a fake. Unfortunately for the authors, this additional crude attempt at authentication has backfired on them. In future forgeries they need to study their history and technology better. A remedial high school Baglish class wouldn't hurt, either.

On 6 May 1997 a meeting was held between the undersigned and Lt Col Woodside, Chief, Secretary of the Air Force Policy and Security Review (SAF/PAS). I presented Lt Col Woodside with the documents referred to SAF/AAZD for review by the CIA (Mr Cooper) on 24 March 1997. I asked Lt Col Woodside if SAF/PAS needed to review documents of this nature prior to release. He stated that SAF/PAS did not require review of all documents prior to release and SAF/AAZD should perform releases in accordance with the letter of understanding that applies to the Gulf War project.

He did state, however, that if documents containing information such as identities of undercover agents or any other information that might be sensitive, SAF/AAZD should direct those to SAF/PAS for review prior to release.

Foreword

In early 1994, the General Accounting Office (GAO) tasked the Air Force, along with other governmental agencies, to locate records regarding alleged events that have become known as the "Roswell Incident." My guidance to Air Force researchers who assisted in this inquiry was simple: find the information and let them review it. If it is classified, declassify it. Hold nothing back, put this issue to rest once and for all. From the outset there was no predisposition to refute or overlook any information. The result was a report completed in July 1994. This document was made available to the public and published as *The Roswell Report: Fact vs. Fiction in the New Mexico Desert*.

Subsequent to the release of that report, we discovered a pattern of actual events, alleged events, and anecdotes indicating that more analysis was required. This analysis encompassed an extended time period and revealed probable incorporation of actual U.S. Air Force research activities, aircraft mishaps, and other operations that were molded into a collection of time compressed scenarios. This report is the result of that additional analysis. (Contrary to allegations of illicit conduct, cover-ups, and other unusual activities, this further examination did not provide information to even remotely suggest that this was the case.) What was discovered, and is included in this publication, are a collection of carefully documented Air Force activities that are the most probable explanations for the series of the events in question.

As you examine this document, you will notice that the actual events are vastly divergent from anecdotes provided to substantiate the scenarios traditionally associated with this topic. Instead, you will find a fascinating glimpse of history that illustrates outstanding accomplishments and self-sacrifices of the men and women that are the U.S. Air Force.

In 1997, as we celebrate our 50th anniversary, I encourage the exploration of our rich and unsurpassed history which stands as testament to the many achievements that have made the U.S. Air Force the greatest aerospace power in history.

Colonel Joseph W. Kittinger, Jr., USAF, (Ret)

Colonel Joseph W. Kittinger, Jr.'s career in the U.S. Air Force and in aviation has spanned the spectrum of experiences; test pilot, balloon pilot, test parachutist, combat fighter pilot, MiG killer, combat squadron commander, and prisoner of war. He has demonstrated, during a nearly 30-year military career and beyond, that he is among the very best in the U.S. Air Force and the field of aeronautics.

Kittinger began his career in 1949 as a U.S. Air Force aviation cadet. After earning his wings at Las Vegas AFB, Nev. in March 1950, he was assigned to fighter squadrons in Germany and then as a test pilot for NATO. In 1953, Kittinger received an assignment as a test pilot to Holloman AFB, N.M. While at Holloman, he began a many year collaboration with the legendary Air Force scientist and physician, Col. John P. Stapp. In association with Stapp on numerous aero-medical projects, Kittinger became the first pilot to fly zero-gravity experiments, now commonly used for astronaut training. For project MAN HIGH on June 2, 1957, Kittinger piloted a high altitude balloon to 96,000 feet to examine the physiological and psychological effects on man in a space equivalent environment. This flight marked the origins of the manned U.S. space program with the experience gained from MAN HIGH being incorporated in NASA's Project MERCURY.

After Man High, and again in association with Stapp, Kittinger directed

Project Excelsior, a study of human free-fall characteristics following aircraft escape at extremely high altitudes. After extensive testing with anthropomorphic dummies, Kittinger made three parachute jumps from high altitude balloons: 76,400 feet on November 16, 1959; 74,700 feet on December 11, 1959; and 102,800 feet on August 16, 1960. For these courageous scientific achievements Kittinger was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Harmon Trophy by President Eisenhower, the still-standing world records for highest parachute jump and length of a free-fall—and the distinction of being the only living person to exceed the speed of sound without an aircraft or spacecraft!

With the completion of Excelsion, Kittinger became the pilot, project officer, and project engineer for Stargazer, an astronomical observation experiment. This was the third and final Air Force manned high altitude balloon project, Kittinger had flown in all three.

In 1963 he was assigned to the Air Commandos (now Special Operations) and flew two combat tours in Southeast Asia in B-26 and A-26 aircraft. After a tour in Germany as a liaison officer with the U.S. Army Special Forces, Kittinger returned to Southeast Asia in 1971 flying F-4 aircraft and commanding the famous 555th "Triple Nickel" Tactical Fighter Squadron at Udorn AB, Thailand. On March 1, 1972 Kittinger engaged and destroyed a MiG-21 over North Vietnam and is credited with an aerial victory. On May 11, 1972, after 483 combat missions and more than 1,000 combat flying hours, Kittinger was shot down over Hanoi and spent 11 months as a POW in the infamous "Hanoi Hilton." When placed with other POWs following solitary confinement and severe torture, Kittinger was moved repeatedly by his North Vietnamese captors due to his effectiveness in motivating other prisoners to maintain strong resistance postures.

Kittinger retired from the Air Force in 1978 and became involved in both sport aircraft flying and gas ballooning. He operated Rosie O' Grady's Flying Circus in his hometown of Orlando, Fla., performing skywriting, banner towing, and hot air and helium balloon demonstrations at nearby Walt Disney World. He also captured the coveted Gordon Bennett Gas Balloon Championship an unprecedented four times (three consecutive), entitling him to retire the trophy.

In September 1984, Kittinger made history again, when, in the tradition of Lindberg, he became the first person to make a solo crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by balloon.

Kittinger's military decorations include the Silver Star with one oak leaf cluster, Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross with five oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star Medal with "V" device and two oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with 23 oak leaf clusters, Purple Heart with one oak leaf cluster, POW medal, and the Republic of Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm.

Kittinger's indomitable spirit, personal courage and dedication to duty are legendary. His ability to achieve seemingly unattainable objectives while earning the respect and absolute loyalty of those who served with him defines this rare breed of warrior-leader.

In October 1995 he received yet another honor and was named a recipient of the prestigious "Elder Statesman of Aviation" award by the National Aeronautics Association. This honor is bestowed upon an individual who over a period of years, has made "significant contributions to aeronautics"

and for "reflecting credit upon himself and America." Without a doubt, there are few that exemplify these virtues more than this truly distinctive American, Joseph W. Kittinger, Jr.

The Bravest Man

America was introduced to Col. John Paul Stapp on December 10, 1954 when he became known as both the "the bravest" and "the fastest" man on earth. Stapp earned these titles following a rocket sled test that accelerated him to 632 miles per hour. He reached this speed in just five seconds—faster than a .45 caliber bullet— and was decellerated to a stop in 1.4 seconds, subjecting his body to more than 42 times the force of gravity! While this was America's introduction to Col. Stapp, the 1954 rocket sled test that examined aircraft restraint devices and human responses to accelative/decelerative forces and windblast, was just one of many achievements of this legendary Air Force physician.

Born in Bahia, Brazil to American missionary parents, Stapp sold pots and pans door to door during the Depression while he earned both undergraduate and graduate degrees in zoology and chemistry at Baylor University. He went on to earn a doctorate in biophysics from the University of Texas, and a doctorate in medicine from the University of Minnesota.

In 1944 Stapp entered the U.S. Army Air Forces and became a flight surgeon. From 1946 to 1963, due to his unique qualifications in biophysics and medicine, he conducted a series of acceleration/deceleration experiments on the high-speed track at Muroc (now Edwards AFB), Calif., ⁵⁸ and later at Holloman AFB, N.M. Developments from these and other

same location resulting in extensive ground and air searches, was essential for researchers to evaluate information collected by the instrumentation and cameras. To assist the recovery personnel a variety of methods were used to enhance the visibility of the dummies: smoke grenades; pigment powder; and brightly colored parachute canopies.⁵⁹ Also, recovery notices promising a \$25 reward were taped to an exposed

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studies resulted in innovations which have saved many lives. These included improved safety belt restraint systems and design specifications for aircraft and automobiles, aircraft ejection and emergency escape systems, refinement of automobile airbag systems, and development of the modern anthropomorphic test dummy.

As commander of the U.S. Air Force Aeromedical Field Laboratory at Holloman AFB, N.M. and later the Aero-Medical Laboratory at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, Stapp won support for the Air Force manned high altitude balloons projects—Man High and Excelsion. As a testament to his thorough safety preparations, these and other extremely hazardous projects administered by Stapp, did not result in a single debilitating injury to a test subject. These projects helped pave the way for future flights of both high altitude aircraft such as the X-15, and of spacecraft for the Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo programs. In fact, Stapp's expertise was called upon to assist in the selection of the initial cadre of astronauts, the "Mercury Seven."

He retired from the Air Force in 1969, but not before amassing a collection of awards and honors. These included two awards of the Legion of Merit for rocket sled experiments, the Cheney Award for 1954, and membership in the National Aviation Hall of Fame.

In association with the Society of Automotive Engineers, Stapp continues to participate in annual conferences in which industry experts assemble to discuss vehicle safety issues. The conferences, now in their 40th year bear his name; the Stapp Automotive Crash and Field Demonstration Conferences.

In 1991, in recognition of a lifetime of unselfish dedication to scientific research, Stapp was awarded the National Medal of Technology, bestowed upon him at the White House by President George Bush.

He is married to the former Lillian Lanese, a former soloist with the Ballet Theater of New York, and resides in Alamogordo, N.M. At 86 years old he continues to maintain a dizzying pace of travel and lectures.

It is not an exageration that virtually every person who has safely operated, or ridden in, an automobile, aircraft, or spacecraft, has benefited from the genius of Col. John Paul Stapp, and owes this brave scientist, physician, and visionary, a great deal of thanks.




Fig. 34. September 12, 1955 edition of *Time* featuring Col. John P. Stapp and his rocket sled experiments at Holloman AFB, N.M.

Dear Lt. McAndrews:

This is a follow-up letter to our previous telephone conversation two weeks ago.

The Air Force released the results of an eight month study which concluded that the debris found at the ranch where Mac Brazel made his discovery in late June/early July 1947, was the remnants of a top secret balloon designed to monitor foreign territory for evidence of nuclear testing designated "Project Mogul".

I had previously written to New Mexico Congressman Steven Schiff to try and locate documentation papers on Roswell. I had advised him on stonewall procedures and delays on behalf of the government even if it was initiated through the General Accounting Office (GAO).

Col. Richard Weaver, Air Force Director of Security and Special Programs, oversight and signatory of the report, stated the Air Force found no evidence of a cover-up, alien bodies or extraterrestrial materials in connection with the story.

There are errors of omission and commission in the official report, which admits that the Air Force did not even attempt to interview all of the Roswell witnesses (well over three hundred) that civilian researchers had located over the years. Most of these witnesses are dead; I wonder why an obvious witness like Mr. Glenn Dennis, a local mortician, who claimed to have first and second-hand knowledge about alien bodies at Roswell, was not interviewed. He was silent many years but has certainly stepped forward recently. He is still well and alive, living in Roswell.

If there was an alleged crash of a secret experimental craft, what role does the hospital have in this regards? Surely, the military personnel (MP's) were not needed here.

Don't you think it was strange that military police were posted around Roswell Army-Air Force Base hospital? The question is why? Glenn Dennis was present at the hospital. He was harassed/chastised for being in the hospital area by hostile military personnel. Do we need MP's at the hospital to guard remnants of a Mogul balloon crash? I think not.

You had also emphatically stated that Jesse B. Johnson, M.D., had no involvement with alien autopsies at Roswell. What proof can you present to me that he was not involved? By the way, you never responded to a fax I sent to you in regards to Dr. Johnson, why?

In closing, I am not sure if I understand completely your duties/role in the Roswell Incident. Are you serving as point-man to screen all calls/letters for the Air Force to set-up this kind of liaison between the military and public? After so many years of debunking and/or giving out misinformation, it seems strange to me.

I await your reply.
