

MARSHFIELD, MISSOURI


At about 11:00 AM on Sept. 22, 1954, myself, of Marshfield. both being employees of Missouri were returning from Bracken, Missouri where we had completed a delivery. Approximately 3 miles east of Marshfield, Missouri on what is known as the Scout Camp Road, we observed far to the west three clouds, or formations of silver objects. They were far enough away or so small that they appeared as no more than a silver dot to our eyes, there were, as a rough guess many thousands of these objects. I stopped the truck to watch these objects and after about 2 minutes my partner noticed another object at what we guessed to be 600 feet high and about 200 yards SW. This object was somewhat like a boomerang in shape with the exception that one side or wing was very short and the other side or wing much longer. If the object was as close as we thought I would guess the entire width to be about 6 or 7 feet. This object was very thin in the wing section and the body as well. This object was silent. It appeared to be covered or made of some sort of plastic or very thin material. It revolved very slowly, the entire object revolved, not just the one wing. As it revolved and the wing came around near the sun it seemed to shine through or nearly through because of the changing in color, it would seem to be much lighter in color when the sun was behind it. The color was of a dark tan with 2 black stripes near the end of the wing or rotor. After we watched the object for a few minutes


it started to climb without changing its flight characteristics or without gaining any RPM of its wing. After rising to what we thought to be about 1500 feet it then started to come down much slower than it had climbed as the climb took only about 20 seconds, after coming down to what we thought about 500 feet it changed its revolving action in that it started tumbling but not any faster than it had revolved. After falling a short distance in this position it emitted puff of white smoke or vapor this was not in a trailing form but just one big puff of smoke or vapor, at this time or any other time did we ever hear any noise, after emitting this smoke or vapor it stopped all motion and fell straight into a small patch of timber, we did not actually see this object hit the ground because of the rough terrain but we did see it go behind the timber line. We then left our truck and went into the woods to see if we could find any other trace of this object. After some minutes we found two places in the earth completely pulverized but did nt show any sign of an animal track, this might or might not of had anything to do with it but it did seem strange in such soft dirt that if an animal or human had made it that it did not leave any track.

When we first noticed this object it seemed to hover at about the 600 feet level. The wing or rotor was slightly curved upward at the tip and near the two dark stripes. When this object stopped its rotating and started to fall the wing or rotor was pointed up indicating the base of this wing which would be the body was the heaviest part. At no time was there much speed involved in any fashion. While falling it did not flutter or turn at all but fell straight down past the timber line. Before falling past the timber line we watched this object for about 15 minutes. After

the two of us searched the area very thoroughly we returned to Marshfield, Missouri and I called the Fordland Air Base and talked with CWO A. R. Justman about this object, he sent four men to Marshfield, Missouri where they picked the two of us up and we returned to the area and made a more thorough search and of a much wider area but without finding any more trace of this object than we had found before. At about 6:00 PA CWO A. R. Justman and myself returned to the area and made a third try at finding the object but still failed to find anything at all other than the two places in the earth that was torn up.

After leaving the truck in the beginning to start the first search Mr. and myself did not see the silver object again that first attracted our attention. The two of us had time to study the object and it is just as I have described it.

and Mr Object was sighted by Mr. Sept 54, at Georef FJNH 0920 which was approximately three (3) miles east of MARSHFIELD, MO. GEOREF FJNH 0620. SOURCES were certain they had observed object for 15 minutes. Condition of sky was bright with sun at SOURCES right when object was observed. Object was tan in color in contrast with blue background of sky. Object appeared to stand still then go up and come down with a pulsation, emitting puffs of white smoke. It did not change shape, brightness, nor did it break up or explode. Object did not move in front of anything at any time. Object appeared and with the naked eye solid and was observed through eyeglasses by Mr. by Mr. No sound was heard from object. It was tan in color with two (2) black stripes near end of protusion (Refer to Sketch, Incl #1, Basic Correspondence). Edges of object were sharply outlined as it rotated counter-clockwise. It was estimated that longest dimension of object was 5 feet (Refer to sketch, Incl #1, Basic Correspondence for size and shape). SOURCES were fairly certain that object appeared to be the size of a grapefruit when held at arms length. Object was last seen falling behind temberline. SOURCES were unable to associate this object with any known object and therefore could not name any material it could have been constructed of. However, Mr. stated that he could make a model of it with moulding clay. Object was first seen while riding in a truck in the open country side. Mr. was driving the truck at 20 miles per hour in a westernly direction when Mr. noticed the object. The truck was stopped, SCURCES debarked and object was further observed. SOURCES were looking southwest when object was first seen. When object was first seen it was 225 degrees from true north and 45 degrees above the horizon. It was 190 degrees from true north and 10 degrees above the horizon when it disappeared.

Weather conditions on date and time of sighting were hot and dry, clear sky and a slight breeze. SOURCES stated that this was the first time they had ever seen an object like this. They had no idea what the object could have been or what could have caused it. SOURCES were unable to estimate the speed of object. They estimated their distance from object as 900 feet maximum and 450 feet minimum.

Mr. Marshfield, Mo., and is 28 years of age. He is a high school graduate and attended an Armored School while in the Army.

Mr. Seemed to be very intelligent, sober and sincere. He was very definite in his statements of what he had seen. He holds a private pilots license and is quite familiar with aircraft. Mr. is also a model airplane enthusiast. Investigator questioned Mr. is as to the possibility of object having been a model airplane and received a negative reply.

Mr. is a tank truck driver for the Marshfield, Mo., where he resides. He is 21 years of age and a grade school graduate. Mr. did not possess the power of his own convictions and simply corroborated statements made by Mr. Williams.

Approximately two (2) hours after the sighting occurred a fire was reported in the city dump. This dump lay in the direct line of travel of the object when last seen. Origin of fire was never determined nor any connection established
