1. Description

- A. Box Kite shape possibly due to two (2) objects in close proximity or one object giving this appearance.
- B. Size when first sighted was approximately that of a pin head. As it passed over head the size was reported to be closer to that of a No. 2 or No. 4 BB. Object appeared as only one instead of two according to the observer.
- C. The color was reported to be similar to the dull metal appearance of sheetmetal.
- D. The observer stated that at first sight there appeared to be two (2) objects. While passing overhead, the observer reported that it appeared as only one object, possibly one partially blocking his vision from the other.
- E. At first sighting, the observer reported the possibility of the two objects being in trail formation.
- F. The observer stated that there were no visible exhaust trails noted at any time.
 - G. The observer stated that no sounds were noted.
- H. The altitude of the object(s) was reported to be in the vicinity of 5,000 feet. (see comment 1)
 - 2. Description of course of the object(s)
- A. The observer stated that he just happened to notice the object(s) while looking at the television antenna atop of the house he was standing near.
- B. The observer estimated the elevation angle to be approximately 20°, and the azimuth to be approximately 225° when first sighted.
- C. The observer estimated the angle of elevation to be 10° and the azimuth to be 045° upon disappearance.
- D. The observer stated that the object(s) appeared to be on a straight and level flight path.
- E. The observer, whom by this time had shown the object to another witness, stated that the disappearance was due to the object going out of sight rather than being lost due to the horizon.
 - F. The reported length of time of flight witnessed was 12 seconds.
 - 3. Manner of Observation
 - A. The observer stated that only ground-visual contact was made.
