II. RELIEBILITY: Contact was made with an official of the Michigan
Department, who for obvious reasons prefers to remain anonymous. This
person has known the SOURCE for several years and stated that the SOURCE'S creditability is very questionable because he has been known to tell some very weird
stories concerning "Flying Saucers". Therefore, wwing to his past history concerning "out of the ordinary" observations and "very unusual" experiences, the
SOURCE'S reliability must be considered as very questionable.

III. SOURCES DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: On 25 April 1955 at approximately 2240 hrs (2603402), while returning home from work, SOURCE claims to have made the observation as he was entering his cottage in Roscommon, Mighigan (GJFQ 2430). The following statement was given by the SOHNCE in a telephone conversation on 28 April with an AISS Flight 3-C Investigating Officer. "As I entered the door of my cottage my eyes were attracted to an unusually bright object moving in the sky that was at least 4 times larger and brighter than any star in the area. I glanced at my watch and noticed that it was about twenty minutes to eleven. I don't know how high it was, but I do know that it must have been among the clouds because I could see them "light up" as it went through them. I watched it for about ten minutes and then it gradually began to lose it brightness until it had completely disappeared". When the SOURCE was asked if the object had any particular shape, or moved in any certain direction or speed, he said that "it just looked like a ball and it had a very irregular course; although I don't know how fast it was going, I'm sure it was faster than any jet airplane that I've ever seen ". When the SOURCE was told that he might have to be contacted again for further information, he said "Gosh Lieutenant, I'm afraid I have a very vivid imagination because I'm sure I've seen things like that before".

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- I. Contact was made with Col. Brownewell, 30th Air Division D/I, who informed Investigating Officer that he had not recei ed notification of the UFOB call.
- 2. Col. Brownewell called the 752d AC&W Sqdn. at Empire, Michigan (GJDC 5648), where the mess ge originated, and was informed that the 752d had no record of the UFOB call. It was later disclosed that an airman, who had not been briefed on UFOB procedures, notified 4602d AISS Headquarters by teletype message and then failed to record it.
- 3. A check with the Wright Patterson Flight Service Center was made by Flight 3-C, 4602d AISS, for aircraft in the area at the time of sighting. Negative results.
- 4. The 661st AC&W Sqdn. at Selfridge AFB, Michigan, and the 752d AC&W Sqdn, at Empire, Michigan reported no unusual readings or occurrences at the time of the alleged UFOB sighting.
- 5. A check with the Selfridge AFB, Weather Station revealed no significant meteorological data which could be related to the UFOB sighting.
