At 0558 Pacific Daylight Time on 4 Sept 1955, 1st Lt Robert F. Plomb, a weather forecaster and pilot stationed, and on duty at Nellis. AFB, Nevada, Observed an unidentified flying object for 7 minutes. The object was observed to be in the Northeast and stationary when first sighted and then when observed through a theodolite with 4X magnification appeared to be heading in a northerly direction. It was apparently round and of a firy orange color with an exhoust or tail about 2 times the diameter of the object in length. It traversed about 15 degrees during the flight of 7 minutes an finally disappeared behind a mountain.

Object could possibly have been a comet, however no method of checking is available at this station.
