He had been somewhat disappointed that the Air Force had apparently abendoned further inquiry into the "Flying Saucer" and expressed satisfaction and enthusiasm that investigation was to be reinstituted. He stated that as soon as the negatives of the "Saucer" were developed, he took them to the offices of "Life" magazine and to the New York Journal American. Both organizations declined to publish them, the latter insisting that water vapor on the camera lens had caused the "Saucer" effect. Finally, the New York World Telegram agreed to publish the pictures together with an article on the sighting. Source stated that subsequent to publication of the article, he received many requests for prints of the picture of the "Saucer" and that he was currently filling these requests on a cost basis. In the course of conversation, Source mentioned that he had been interested in "Saucer Phenomena" for some time prior to the actual sighting. He is now participating more actively, attending "Saucer Club" mettings, etc. Continuing in this vein, the Source demonstrated more than a cursory knowledge of the terminology and more notorious names of "Flying Saucer" literature, e.g. Adamski, Keyhoe, Vaeth. III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

- 1. Sunday, 15 May at 1600 Eastern Daylight Saving Time, Source and companion, the panion, had gone to the roof of their residence a four-story apertment building in downtown Manhattan to take some sampshots.
- 2. Source was using a rented English reflex sighting box camera. The camera had two (2) f. settings (apertures); f:ll and f:8. Two speed settings were available; 1/25th second and 1/75th second. Focus determined by visually estimating range and adjusting distance setting. No range finder accompanied or was attached to the camera
- 3. Source faced south-east, preparing to take adjusting the camera, Miss BOUILLER gasped and excitedly pointed in the direction of the northwest quadrant of the sky. Source turned and saw an object he estimated to be at an altitude of 7,000 feet. The object was dark in color and elliptical in shape. Azimuth and altitude of the object when first observed were 270° and 45° respectively. The object moved to the north at great speed, describing an arc in its flight-path (See incl), coming to rest momentarily in the north at 45° elevation. It then returned along the same arc to its original position (Point A). Almost immediately, the object repeated the cycle (Point B) and upon reaching its northern position, howered momentarily and rose vertically in the northern sky and disappeared (Point C).
- 4. Upon sighting the object, the Source immediately set the camera at f:8 and shutter speed of 1/75th second. Focus was set at infinity. He repeatedly shot the object while it was visible. Althought he exposed ten (10) frames, only five (5)

- 5. While in the western position, the object was dark in color. As it progressed northward, it became brighter and became almost transparent. It gleamed brightly in the sun, like the aluminum skin of an aircraft. There was no sound accompanying the object nor did it display an exhaust pattern or condensation trail. The object's size was estimated to be two hundred feet or a quarter size at arm's length. Distance appeared to be "several miles."
- 6. The object was observed for approximately one and one-half minutes before disappearing. The sky was clear in bright sunlight and the temperature was relatively high.
- 7. Source was emphatic in belief that the object was physically real and not an optical phenomenon. He did not think it could possibly have been a balloon because of its extreme velocity and arc-like trajectory.

- 2. COC, EADF, Stewart AFB, Newburgh, N.Y. indicated that there was no unusual air activity in the Manhattan area at the time of the sighting. Specific inquiry was made with regard to balloons or dirigibles with a negative reply. However, one incident of note had occurred in the metropolitan area on the same afternoon at an earlier hour. At 15/1713Z MAY 55, the 26th Air Division reported a sighting that had occurred at 15/1630Z MAY 55 at position HJBL 1156. The object like a red watermellon, was observed by a GOC Observer of Mount Vernon, N.Y. Altitude was given at 1,000 feet to the south of observer's position. This object was positively identified as a balloon by Lt. Curry, Intelligence Watch Officer of 26th Air Division.
- 3. The 12th Weather Squedron of Stewart AFB, Newburgh, N.Y. furnished the following summary of weather conditions for 15/2000Z MAY 55: LaGuardia at 2030Z reported scattered clouds at 2,500'; visibility 15 miles; temperature 72°F; dew point 36°F; wind from the north at 6 MPH; barometer 30.14. Floyd Bennet reported clear sky; temperature 70°F; dew point 43°F; wind from the east at 2 MPH. - l. The possibility that the balloon identified in PART THREE par 2 of this report accounts for the sighting is extremely remote. Position of the balloon was fixed at a point approximately seventeen miles northeast, three and one helf hours earlier than the sighting in question. The average wind between 1,000 feet and 10,000 feet was reported at 325° at 15 knots. The balloon would logically have traveled well beyond the metropolitan area in the specified time interval. At standard rate of ascent, moreover, the balloon would have disintegrated long before 2000Z. The sighting has been described as varying in color from dark to gleaming aluminum. The balloon is described as red. Time of the sighting was one hour prior to scheduled radiosonde releases (2100Z); therefore, it is considered unlikely that activities of other weather stations is significant. The peculiar trajectory pattern ascribed to the sighting cannot rationally be collated with that of the balloon.
- 2. No significant radar plots can be established for the time of the sighting. Dirigible activity has been reported in the negative.
- 3. Celestial phenomena are considered unrelated to the sighting. The sun, in relation to the observer's position, was at true azimuth 254.5°, observed altitude 44.5 degrees. Mars, Mercury and the bright star Aldebaran had already transited the observer's meridian and were too close to the sun for observation. Venus lay to the west but was very low on the horizon.
- 4. Source's estimate of size, distance and altitude of sighting are equivocal. Inspection of negative #3 reveals that the length of the object is almost lightimes greater than the TV tower atop the Empire State Building. The tower is known to be 200 feet long. The Source stated that the object was several miles distant. At a range of three miles, the object would measure about 750 feet across. It is inconceivable that an object of such size, flying over a city inhabited by 8,000,000 people, would be seen by only two individuals.
- 5. The Source fixed the position of the original sighting at 270°, observed altitude 45°. The sun's position is calculated at 254.5°, observed altitude 44.5°. In a clear sky, within 15° of the sun, the object would hardly be discernible, possibly invisible. Although the object was described as opaque in the west, becoming brighter as it progressed to the north, the negatives do not support this claim. In negative #2, the object is opaque, with maximum delineation; in negative #3, oriented in the same direction, the object appears as an amorphous, colorless blob.
- 6. Disregarding the slight blurring effect produced by camera movement, all the buildings shown in the negatives are in focus. The water tower shown in negative #2 is not more than 300 feet from the camera lens. It is sharply outlined. The object is never in focus, nor can its shape be determined with any degree of certainty. The Source stated that the exposures were made with the range element of the camera set at infinity. Objects at a distance greater than 15 feet to 20 feet should be in focus. Therefore, it may be postulated that the object was less than 15 feet from the camera lens. Consequently, the object was relatively minute, probably less than six inches across.
- 7. Optically, such an effect might be produced by the hysteretic effect of lens accommodation of the human eye, when focusing from a proximate to a distant object. Both Sources first observed the object visually without any optical instrument. The camera, however, is not subject to such an effect, focus being permanently fixed. This hypothesis is accordingly discarded.


COMMENTS of Approving Officer:

- 1. Concur with the opinion of the Preparing Officer that the object described in this report and the photographs of it are fraudulent for the following reasons:
- a. The inclosed photographs were taken to the local U.S. Weather Bureau and Air Force Weather Station for analysis. It is the opinion of the above agencies that the object cannot be attributed to cloud activity.
- b. The day (Sunday) of the sighting coupled with the fact that the area of sighting is highly unionized would tend to eliminate the possibility of smoke or steam. Also, there is no railroad activity in the area.
- c. Commercial and Air Force photographers were contacted concerning the possibility of manufacturing the inclosed photographs with the type camera used by the source. In all cases it was agreed that it would be possible by placing a small object within 15 to 20 feet of the camera lens and setting the range element at infinity, thereby giving a blurred effect to any object within the 15 to 20 foot range.
- d. The fact that the source is a "saucer fan" and was particularly interested in publicity seems to substantiate the possibility of a hoax.
- e. Although the object was given a rapid rate of speed by the source, he managed to snap ten pictures (of which only five were returned) in one and one-half minutes, which do not, by position, give a rapid movement to the object.
- 2. This report and pictures are forwarded to ATIC for further analysis and evaluation.





Wooshing Object Sighted in City Is Just One of Those Things

So quietly, indeed, did the season arrive—Sunday, May 15, at 4 p.m., if you're interested in making a note of the time—that it might well have gone unnoticed had it not been for the alertness of a young television technician named Warren Siegmond and an attractive French girl, who as it turned out—well, there's no point in going into that.

What happened was simply this: Mr. Siegmond rented an English reflex-type camera for \$1.25 on May 13 and bought two rolls of films to make pictures of the attractive French girl, whose name is Jeannine Bouiller and who works for the French Government.
