The following Unidentified Flying Object Report is submitted:

- 1. Description of the object.
  - a. Shape: Circular.
  - Size: As large as a basketball held at arms length.
- Color: None. (The object radiated an intense white light.)
  - Number: One (1).
  - Formation: N/A
  - f. Discernible features: Negative.
  - Tail, trail or exhaust: Negative.
- h. Sound: If there was any sound it was covered up by two aircraft which were flying in the area.
- i. Other pertinent or unusual features: The edge of the object was clearly defined and was surrounded by a tenuous band of light.

## Description of course of object.

a. What first called the attention of observer to the object? The large size of the object.

- b. Angle of elevation of the object when first observed: 45 degrees.
- c. Angle of elevation of the object when it disappeared: Approximately 15 degrees.
- d. Description of flight path and maneuvers of object:
  Object was following a north to south flight path. Maneuvers included a zigzag course with 90 degree turns. At times the object hovered with no apparent motion. The object approached an aircraft which was flying west to east and flew near it. The object seemed about to collide with the aircraft and then dodged away from it. Observer stated that the flying object appeared elliptical at times during its maneuvers.
- e. Manner of disappearance of object: The object was in sight until it passed over the horizon. The area where the object was sighted was heavily wooded.
  - f. Length of time in sight: 5 to 6 minutes.
