III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

" On August 23, 1955 at about 10:45 pm Estr, my friend (and I were standing near the south side of my house, facing to the south, when my attention was called to a moving object in the sky. It was crange in color and was travelling south at a high altitude and great speed. After observing its flight for about fifteen seconds, it turned east and disappeared about ten seconds later. Shortly afterwards we were scanning the sky and another object of the same type appeared in the southwest. It remained visable for two or three minutes. At one time we could spot three of them travelling a great distance apart and in the same general direction, but shortly afterwoods they took different courses. One circled the dome of the sky while the other made a semi-circle and reversed itself before returning on its original course. The other circled the dome of the sky and then turned and went directly across the dome of the sky. Another appeared to come to a complete stop and then it continued on its regular course . While it was standing still it looked like one of the stars in back of it. At one time, when one was turning, it appeared to have a red dome which was visable through the binoculars. The objects appeared to be above the atmosphere of the earth since they didn't appear to lose altitude as an object would when passing over the horizon. They never showed signs of losing their brilliance and didn't fly in formation at any time. I think that the visable light was due to reflection from the sun."

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: SOURCE had been observing stars through his friend's telescope when he noticed a light in the sky which he at first presumed to be a jet. It suddenly disappeared but no sound seemed to accompany the light. Shortly afterwards, SOURCE related seeing three different and distinct lights in the sky, each appearing to be moving in a different direction from the other two.

The objects seemed to possess a bright orange color and have disk-like shapes. SOURCE further estimated their speed in "thousands of miles per hour in order to go across the dome of the sky in a few minutes." SOURCE'S estimate of the altitude above the earth at which these objects were travelling was that they were "high enough to reflect the sun's light."

In conclusion, SOURCE stated that he wasn't sure whether the objects were a phenomenon of nature or a mechanical devise, but that he was inclined to believ that they were mechanical creations of another planet since he didn't believe any Earth-made devise would be capable of travelling that high and that fast.

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- 1. A check with the Air Traffic Control Center at Washington National Airport, (GeoRef GJNJ 5856), for information in confirmation of the 23 August UFOB sighting yielded negative results.
- 2. Assigned to the Mashington National Airport (see Incl#1), stated that his only knowledge of the sighting came from 1401st Air Base Wing officials at Andrews AFB who called his office for weather data at the time of the sighting.
- 3. Andrews AFB Operations and Weather (GeoRef GJPJ 0713) was contacted but had no information to give in regard to the 23 August UFCB sighting.
- 4. Bolling AFB Operations and Weather (GeoRaf GJNJ 5857) likewise offered no confirmation.
- 5. The Assistant Chief of Meteorological Observations, US Weather Bureau, Washington, D.C., very cordially furnished the following information on halloons controlled by the US Weather Service: 1) That weather balloons are launched every six hours by Weather Service stations throughout the country. 2) These balloons often are of the 500# rasonde variety, containing either a magnesium bulb or an auto-activated illuminating attachment. Either of these two types of lighting would be difficult to observe once the carrier reaches an altitude of 10,000 ft., which, assuming the average rate of ascent to be 600ft/min., would be accomplished within 10-12 minutes. 3) That the Silver Hill Weather Station, (GeoRef GJRJ-0550), is the principal station operated by the US Weather Service in the Washington vicinity.
- 6. The Director of the Silver Hill Weather Station, Mr. Argonne, disclosed that a rasonde balloon of the regular type had been released on the evening of 23 August at 10:00 EST. It had travelled in a northeasterly direction(toward Arlington, Virginia) as it disappeared from view. By 10:15 EST, the balloon would have been directly over Arlington at an approximate altitude of 15,000 ft., and increasing according to its normal rate of ascent. Its course at this time could have been followed by binoculars.
- 7. The US Naval Observatory, Washington, D.C., was contacted by telephone but was unable to confirm the sighting. Mr. J.L. Gossner of the Observatory's Equatorial Division, when told of the traversing and random shifting of the UFOB, mentioned that the turbulence from the earth's atmosphere might produce this impression if a star were observed through the atmosphere media. Whether 6X100 binoculars could record this phenomenon seemed doudtful to him. (This was the type of binoculars used by the Arlington observers.) Mr. Gossner further stated that on the night of 23 August at approximately 10:15 EST he had noticed a bright light in the sky accompanied by a red light. Though there was no sound audible, he falt that the lights were from an aircraft flying at an extremely high altitude. He reported that it had changed direction several times while he was observing it. His suggestion was that the Arlington observers may have seen the same thing which he had, but merely had interpreted it differently.
- 8. Maj. Sloan of the 75th AA Bn, Andrews AFB, Maryland, was contacted but was unable to confirm any of the sightings with positive radar data.
- 9. Likewise, Maj. Sutton, AA Ops Officer, 19th AA Group, charged with the AA de-

- 9. sighting and nothing unusual was reported by his various installations. In addition he mentioned that he has 6-7 sets operating in the Arlington vicinity.
- 10. Lt. Beals of the 647th AC&W Sq, Marassas, Virginia reported that he had received no information which might serve to confirm the Arlington sighting.
- 11. The Baltimore-Washington Filter Senter gave a negative report on the UFCB sighting when approached by the Flight 3-H investigator.
- 12. Finally, Olmstead Flight Service Center was questioned about the sighting. Capt. Anderson, the Officer on duty in Middleton, reported that has office had received no information in confirmation of the UFCB sighting on 23 August.

COMMENTS of the Preparing Officer:

- l. In the opinion of the Preparing Officer, the 23 August 1955 sighting of a UFCB in the Washington, D.C. area was caused by misinterpretations of the changing course of an ascending Rasonde weather balloom by observers on the ground, combined by the later sighting of a high flying aircraft bearing multiple lights, changing direction and apparently emitting no sound. Though there was actually no association between the first and the second object, the fact that the second phenomenon appeared so closely upon the first created the misconception that the two were associated.
- a., In general appearance the first clearly observed object was orange in color and had a disc-like configuration, which seems to leave no doubt that this object could have been a weather balloon. The Silver Hill rasonde balloon was launched at approximately 10:00 EST and was observed to be travelling in the direction of Arlington as it passed from the view of the weather station.
- b. Also, this balloon which within ten to twelve minutes after launching could have been tracked for at least 25 minutes thereafter by observers on the ground possessing 6X100 binoculars.
- c. An aircraft flying a changing pattern high above the city could easily have created the apparent directional changing phenomenon, which, if accompanied by no sound and appearing closely after the sighting of the first object, may quickly have been attributed by excited observers on the ground to strangs flying objects, either in or from outer space. This latter conclusion as to the origin and location of the object or objects might at first appear ridiculous, but to a person who is more proper ly acquainted with celestial activity, such an assumption might enter the mind quite readily. --- Both observers were confident that what they saw had not come from Earth.
- d. One of the principal reasons the observers doubted that the phenomenae could have been caused from a rising balloon or an aircraft traversing the sky was its apparent speed. The speed of an object when recordedby the makeded eye can be highly deceptive, particularly at night.

COMMENTS of Approving Officer:

- 1. Further investigation requested of Flight 3-H revealed that radar contacts were negative in the Arlington area at the time of the sighting, eliminating aircraft as a cause of the sighting. Although winds aloft could substantiate the course of the first object as being a balloon, the speed and duration of the sighting do not correlate with those of a balloon. The other objects, similar in description to the first, do not conform to any known phenomena.
 - 2. This report is forwarded to ATIC as "unknown".
