REPORT OF UNIDENTIFIED PLYING OBJECT

1. Description of the object:

(A)

a. As seen edge-on, the object appeared to be thin and wide, tapered on either end as shown below:

Later on, the object appeared to bank left and presented the following appearance:

- b. Although the object was reported to be about the size of a present day jet fighter, it is estimated that this would be the equivalent of a silver dollar held at arms length. The observer seemed very positive that the flying object couldn't have been more than 100 yards away from him at any time.
- 9. The color was silver in appearance. This was when the object was down-sun. As it moved up-sun, it took on a bluish hue.
 - d. One object was sighted.
 - e. (omitted since only one object was sighted)
- f. The object appeared absolutely smooth, with no breaks such as panelling, hatches, exhaust ports, etc. When the object was in a banked attitude, a small bubble typs canopy was seen on top in the center of the object. This is shown in the second drawing above. Observer can't remember if this canopy was transparent or not, but he definitely remembers that he didn't see anyone or anything inside the canopy. There were no ideatifying markings seen.
- g. There was no tail or any other protruberances on the object other than the canopy described above. No exhaust, flame, smoke, or any other indication of propulsion was seen. There seemed to be no visible system of propulsion.
 - A. There was no noise of any kind emanating from the object. The driver braked his car to a stop and remained that way the entire time the object was in sight. He remembers that there was little or no wind to interfere with his hearing.
 - i. The observer clearly remembers that the object, as it moved around kim, left me indication of its manner of propulsion. No dust was kicked up, mor was any wind or slip-stream noticed, that could have been caused by the objects passing.
 - 2. Emeription of course of object:
- a. The observer was by himself in his car. He was on the way from Tweeipa, California to Banning, California on U.S. 70. About three to five miles out of Banning the road turned right around a small hill. As he was turning right around the hill he first was the object. He noticed at out his right front window first. It appeared to be hovering about 100

fact off the ground and was about 100 yerds away from him. He seemed to be quite sure of this range to the object and swears that it was never more than about 100 yards from him the entire time. As soon as he saw the object, he was so frightened that he braked his car to a halt and sat there and watched it in facination.

- b. He gave no elevation angle on the object; nowever, he first waw it through his right hand window, so the object must have been very low to the ground.
- o. The object finally returned to approximately the same position where it was first sighted, then suddenly zoomed upward at a tramendous speed in a west-northwesterly direction to a position angle of about 20 and disappeared from sight. The observer states that the object didn't just slowly fade from view, but disappeared almost immediately. He estimates that the object, from the time it started up until it could no longer becase, completed this maneuver in less than a second. He seemed to be genuinely assessed that it could have disappeared so suddenly.
- a. The object was either hovering or moving very slowly when he first noticed it. As he braked to a stop, the object slowly moved abross the highway in front of him moving in a counter-clockwise direction. After crossing the highway, it banked left (this was when he reported seeing the same point of him and moved up his right side to approximately the same position in which it was originally seen. He sat in his seat in the car and was able to watch the object during the entire time. He estimated that it took about 8 or 9 seconds for the object to completly circle him and seemed very positive that the range was constant at about 100 yerds the entire time. During the entire time the observer was sure that he saw no lights or anything else that would indicate that the object was signalling or trying in any manner to contact the or signal anyone else.
 - a. As stated in c. above, the object returned to its original posttion, then suddenly zoomed out of sight.
 - f. Total time the object was in sight was about a to le seconds.
 - 3. Manner of observation:
 - a. Ground-visual.
 - b. No optical aids were used. The observer was not wearing glasses. He states that his windshield and windows were clean.
 - c. Not applicable since sighting was made from the ground.
 - 4. Time and date of sighting:
 - a. Object sighted at approximately 061330Z June 1956
 - b. Light conditions: day
 - 5. Bosation of observer.

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- a. Observer account of weather conditions:

 Er. states that it was a beautiful lay. No clouds and visibility unlimited. It was still fairly cool, although he did state that later on in the day it was very hot. There was little or no wind.
 - b. Weather report from USNAMTC, Point Mugu, California:

- 8. There is no known unusual activity or condition, reterological, astronomical or otherwise, which night account for the sighting. There were no other cars on the highway near him during the encounter.
- 9. Since the observer did not report the object for a week, it is doubted that any interception action was taken.
- 10. There was no other aircraft signted in the vicinit, during or after the alleged encounter.
- 11. LT Marvin S. BLAIR, USN, 4204.0/1100, Assit Officer-in-Charge, Guided Missile Unit FIFTY, USN CBC Port Hueneme, Californie took the information from Mr. on his sighting. Mr. felt that he should tell someone, so when he made his regular stop at the Beauty Shop to make a delivery, he reported his sighting to the Security Force Officer on that the Construction Battalion Center. The Security Officer referred him to LT BLAIR at Guided Missile Unit FIFTY. LT BLAIR tried to ask as many pertinent questions as he could think of that might shad some light on this event. As far as LT BLAIR could tell, the man seemed to be telling the truth. It must be pointed out thought, that there were no witnesses to what Mr. saw and no photographs were taken of the phenomena. The only basis of opinion therefore is LT BLAIFS own impression of what had to say. The man appeared to be emotionally disturbed over what he claims to have seen. To start with, he stated that he had been afraid to tell anyone about the matter because "they would think I was orazy". He faat that it was hid duty to tell someone, preferrably the military, about it. He requested that his mame be omitted because he was afraid the newspapers would get the story and he would them become an object of ridicule. Mr. asemed genuinely disturbed, and repeated over and over again, "I don't drink, I wasn't tired, I've never had halucinations, I don't read science-fiction, I've never read any books about flying saucers - only what I've noticed in the newspapers. I have no history of mental illness, my vision is 20-20, etc. ". Mr. was told to return home and write as detailed an account of the experience as he could, omitting nothing. He readily agreed to make such statement under oath and stated that he would even be willing to submit to a lie-detector test if it would help people believe that he was talling the truth. This statement was taken by LT BLAIR at 1500 PDST, 13 Juna 1956 - one week after the alleged event took place.
- a. Mirage effect and other phenomena were considered, but if the weather conditions were actually like they were reported, this explanation doesn't seem likely. No final conclusions could be reached as to the cause for this phenomena.
- 12. No physical evidence exists to corroborate this sighting.

I. SOURCE:

II. RELIABILITY:

In a personal interview Mr. appeared to be sincere and positive in all his statements except for exact location and directions at the point of sighting object because he claimed never to have driven the road before. He was relaxed and conversed freely but did exibit a strong imagination and interest in life on other planets during the interview.

- III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: Source was driving his automobile on a secondary road between Yucaipa and Beaumont, California at approximately 40 mph. Upon rounding a curve, Source saw the object either hovering or moving very slowly 45 degrees to the right and 20 degrees up from the horizon. As Source stopped the automobile, object slowly moved across highway in front of and circled the automobile to approximately the same position at which first sighted and then traveled upward at a 20 degree angle directly away from Source. Object disappeared in approximately a half second. A continual bank was maintained through the entire sighting and the object had what appeared to be a bubble type canopy on top facing the Source. Source estimated duration of sighting was 8 to 10 seconds and the object took 8 to 9 seconds to complete the circle of the automobile. The object was viewed through windows of the automobile during the entire maneuver.
 - A. Object appeared to be solid and did not move behind anything while being observed. Source claims object was shimmering silver in color while down direction of the sun and changed to a dull silver with a bluish hue but darker than the sky in the background while on the side towards the sun. No visual aids were used.
 - B. Source's opinion of size of the object, based on an estimation of 300 foot distance and size of silver dollar held at arms length was 30 feet in its longest dimension.
 - C. Source stated there were no other vehicles on the road either prior to or immediately following the sighting.

D. Source admits to being emotionally disturbed and frightened at the time of sighting. Source stated that his foot was trembling on the accellerator pedal.

E. No opinion of cause of sighting was made by Source exept being a strange flying object with no noise or visible means of populsion such as flame, smoke or exhaust.

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- 1. Mr. was interviewed on 20 July 1956.
- 2. Capt Billingsley Beattie, Ops Plans, AF Flight Test Center, Edwards Air Force Base, California was questioned as to possibility of test aircraft in the vicinity at the time of sighting. He stated seven test aircraft were airborne at the time but none near Beaumont and that there are no aircraft with the configuration described at Edwards AFB.
- 3. Lt. W.L. Rodeman, City Police, Beaumont, California was contacted for possible further reports of the same sighting with negative results.
- 4. Detachment 7, 6th Weather Group, Norton Air Force Base was contacted and the following information was obtained:
 - a. Local weather at time of sighting: Three miles visibility with haze and smoke. Tops of haze approximately 4,000 feet. Temperature 50 degrees F. Winds calm. One tenth haze cover. No clouds.
 - b. A double temperature inversion existed at the time of sighting.

 The first was between 1800 feet at 11.4 degrees C. and 3500 feet at 15.2 degrees C. The second was between 5800 feet at 13.2 degrees C. with top at 6700 feet at 16 degrees C.
 - c. Winds aloft are indicated below:

COMMENTS OF THE PRIPARING OFFICER:

- 1. It is the opinion of the Preparing Officer that no positive statement can be made of this sighting as only one observer viewed the object but a possible optical phenomena does exist for the following reasons:
 - a. The fact that a double temparature inversion did exist during the time of sighting lends weight to the possibility of an optical phenomena solution. (Refer to paragraph 4b of Part Two).
 - b. The prevailing winds were from the North West and the 0900Z lounding of weather balloons from Sandburg or Santa Maria, California could possibly prace a balloon over point of sighting at 1330Z for reflection on the inversion layer.
