h. Any other unusual activity or condition, meteorological, astronomical, or otherwise, which might account for the sighting:

i. Interception or identification action taken (such action may be taken whenever feasible, complying with existing air defense directives):

(1) Topcoat diverted two (2) 506th SFW aircraft which searched the area at 45,000 feet visually but made no contact. Also Topcoat scrambled two (2) F86D from Perrin, they searched the area from altitudes of 15,000, 20,000, 25,000 and 30,000 feet with their radar, but made no contact. All aircraft was returned to base.

j. Location of any air traffic in the area at time of sighting:

(1) Sighted one (1) fighter type aircraft five (5) miles east of reported location of object.

k. Position, title, and comments of the preparing officer, including his preliminary analysis of the possible cause of the sighting:

(1) The object sighted could have been anything from a weather balloon to a very high flying aircraft. Sufficient objective info was not received by Topcoat to warrant classification in any way except that it was an unknown object. Leon D. Levesque, 1st Lt., Senior Director.

l. Existence of physical evidence such as materials and photographs:

(1) None.

2. Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED] sighted the object moving very slow in a northerly direction. It was at a very high altitude and appeared to be very small in size. It looked round in shape and no markings were visible. The object passed directly over their house. Mr. [REDACTED] tried to use a 120 power telescope to identify the object but was unable to track object due to its rapid movement and size. The object was observed for approximately a two (2) hour period.
