

"Flying lisc" Incident in Dayton, Chio May 1940

Sighted by Mrs. Street at 16:25 hours, 3 May 1049. The sighting was reported to viewed by the undersigned (A. 3. Devarmond, analysis Div., Intelligence Dest., Eq. A.M.C.) the following information was presented:

Her attention was first called to the object by Mrs. It was sighted almost directly north of their position in the back yards of their homes. In elevation, it appeared to be just above some horses in the next street (estimated by undersigned 25° elev.) but the distance away could not be determined. It proceeded in an easterly direction, climbing radually, seemed to level out for a short while, then climbed rapidly, disappearing at very high altitude in the northeasterly direction. The object was round in share when seen in full size, but flat when seen edrewise. It was oscillating in roll ("flipping over" in words of witness) continuously. One side was dull in color but the other side flashed brightly in the sun. The speed of the object could not be estimated but appeared to be travelling "pretty fast". The size could not be estimated, it did not appear very large in the distance, but could have been a good-sized object. There was no trail of vapor or smoke of any kind. She had no idea what the object could be. This latter statement was repeated several times. The time in sight was described as two or three minutes, but when a five second count was made by the undersigned, she thought it was probably a much shorter time than "two or three" minutes.

The location and direction of movement coincided exactly with the description of Mrs. The She also described the "flipping motion" stating that, when first seen, it appeared to be moving rather leisurely, but picked up speed golden or bronze in color. She could not estimate the distance away, however, when questioned about the size she was quite certain that it was about twice the size of the aircraft that were always flying around and moved faster than airplane. The time in sight was described as "two or three" minutes. There was no trail of vapor or smoke and no noise. There was no other object of any but not round in all directions. It appeared to be flat, when seen edgewise, thus could hardly be seen in that attitude. Her son also saw the object and the way a flat round object sails when thrown and spun, turning over gradually.)
