





1. The following is an account of an observation of an unidentified aerial object sighted from a position of 33° 53' 30" N, 117° 15' 30" W, at approximately 0350 GCT, 14 October 1950. The sighting was made by a USAF officer-navigator during a period of celestial navigation.

Undetermined, but appeared to be at a very great altitude as Altitude: h. though within the celestial sphere.

j. Exhaust trail: None."

- 2. The weather prevailing at the time of the observation was: Clear skies, with but slight haze and slight surface fog. Surface winds and winds aloft were not determined.
- 3. While the object observed resembled somewhat a meteor, this possibility was ruled out because the object did not follow a constant path. The apparently high altitude, the high speed and erratic movements of the object would suggest that it was other than a conventional type aircraft.
- 4. Apparent confirmation of the observation is furnished by a USAF sergeant who reports having observed a similar object.
