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



He was nervous during interrogation and slightly reluctant on details for fear of giving misleading information and stated he wanted no one to think him carried away by the "flying disc" theory but had been instructed by Air National Guard officers to report anything unusual to proper authorities.

- 3. One T-33 jet aircraft departed Westover AFB 0811 and returned 0930. At least three C-54/R5D type aircraft were flying in the vicinity of West-over Air Force Base at the time object was sighted. The number and type of commercial aircraft in vicinity at time is unknown.
- 4. No testing devices had been released prior to sighting.
- 5. Interrogator: Capt Lloyd A. Olsen, Wing Intelligence Officer, Westover Air Force Base.

E. Interrogator's Comment:

The attracting noise may possibly have been caused by some commercial vehicle or apparatus in vicinity of observer and object sighted may have been false vision due to bright sun or other reflecting object nearby. The observer appeared sincere in reporting the incident but was unable to furnish specific details due to the short time object was in view. Although the observer stated the object was in view approximately 30 seconds, it is the interrogator's opinion the time was much less, probably 5 to 10 seconds. The observer stated that he was familiar with the sounds of all types of conventional and jet aircraft and that the sound which attracted his attention was different from these.

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

SUBJECT: Unidentified Flying Objects

TO:

Director of Special Investigations Headquarters, U. S. Air Force Washington 25, D. C.

- 1. SYMPSIS: An unidentified flying object was observed over the town of Oak Ridge, Tennessee from 1245 to 1300 hours, 5 December 1950 by two (2) persons.
- Between 1245 and 1250 hours, 5 December 1950, Mrs. becurity Division, Cak Eldge, Tennessee while standing on Tennessee Avenue at the west end of the bus platform across from the Post Office, observed an object over the top of the Post Office building, flying in an easterly direction at a slow speed, at a distance of approximately two (2) miles and at an altitude of about 500 feet. Ars. Comer stated that the object was north of her position. In the words of Mrs. Example the object was "brilliant metallic, as alwainum or highly burnished metal that reflected the light, shape round, flat or disk like, and appeared to turn slightly to the left or northwest and when turning the appearance changed and the light was no longer reflected by the object and it an eared smaller and dark gray in color, but no change in speed". The object left no definite trail; however, on the edge of the left side of the object a misty "hale" could be seen. The object flew a straight course and no noise could be heard. The total time of observation was about sixty (60) seconds.

Oak Midge, while in her yard, observed an object described similarly with the one observed by Mrs. Turner with the exception that the object was moving west when she observed it.

On 7 December 1950 Mr Landsland, Meteorological
Division, Oak Ridge, Tennessee stated that the following weather conditions
prevailed at 1800 hours on 5 December 1950: Wind was from the east at 6 mph,
the sky was clear, visibility twelve (12) miles, temperature was 46 degrees F. W

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
