

Gonzales, Texas, was interviewed in reference to an umusual aerial phenomena she had seen near Gonzales, Texas, approximately in October 1951. The object had been sighted while she and her husband were driving toward Gonzales on Highway # 3 approximately one (1) mile north of Gonzales. As they reached the summit of a small hill the object appeared straight shead and at first it was believed to be a grayish cloud with a white circle around it. Upon closer observation, by both she and her husband, it seemed to be something other than a cloud and it was moving as if there was some means of power propelling it. Mrs. Stated she did not know if the object was of a solid material or not. She further stated that if she had been alone and the only person to have seen it she would have considered it a figment of her imagination, but since her husband also saw it and after they had discussed what they saw, they decided it could have been a "flying saucer".

Mrs. Rave the following information concerning the aerial phenomena:

- Q. Date of observation?
- A. Approximately eight (8) months ago.
- Q. Exact time of observation (local)?
- A. Four (4) five (5) PM.
- Q. Place of observation?
- A. Approximately one (1) mile north of Gonzales on Highway # 3.
- Q. Position of observer (air, car, building, location of give details)?
- . A. Driving automobile south on highway.
 - Q. What attracted attention to object?
 - A. Looked up when came over hill and it was right in front.
 - Q. Number of objects and sketch of formation or grouping?
 - A. One.
 - Q. Apparent size (compare to known object, i.e., sun, moon, thumb or fist at arms length)?
 - A. Round, about two (2) yards in diameter.
 - Q. Color of object?
 - A. Center looked white, creamy was about two (2) feet in diameter.
 Outer ring was a darker grayish white.
 - Q. Shape (give graphic description compare with known object)?
 - A. Outer ring was round, unable to determine depth, inner ring looked circular but more than on one circle. Looked like smoke.



- A. Mrs. Hames Street, Gonzales, Texas.
- Q. Did observer wear glasses, especially polaroid glasses at time of sighting or was object viewed through canopy, window, or other transparent material?
- A. Wears glasses all time had them on at time. Saw through windshield was clean. Able to recognize aircraft.


Sheriff McGINTY further advised that he did not know but knew his father very well and that he worked for the City of Gonzales.




Mr advised that he had known Mrs. for many years and believed her to be completely reliable, honest, trustworthy, and that any information she related would be credible.
