No sound or type of propulsion could be detected. At all times the objects appeared to be flat and no other characteristics could be determined

- 2. The object was first sighted at 2030 hours 137 16 June 1952 and remained under observation for less than a minute.
- 3. The object was observed visually by Sgt Strong From the ground, / He had no type of leases or glasses for aid.







A group of unidentified serial objects was sighted at 2030 hours MST on 16 Jun 52 about 1 mile south of Walker AFB, Roswell, New Mexico. The objects were of a grayish hue in color and their entimated altitude above the terrain was about 5,000 feet. The objects traveled in a half moon formation in a general Southwest to Northwest line from a point about a mile south of Walker AFB until they disappeared from sight several miles north of the base. The rate of speed was estimated to be between 500 and 600 miles per hour.

This sighting is similar to these reported in the press and other publications. Although the objects were viewed for only a short period of time, the reliability to the observer is felt to warrant the probability of the sighting.
