### DETAILS:

1. This investigation is opened at the direction of the District Commander predicated upon information furnished this District by Mr. and Mrs.

T, who reported sighting an aerial phenomenon on 30 June 1952.

### AT WILLIAMS AIR FORCE BASE, ARIZONA

- 2. On 1 July 1952, Mr. and Mrs. reported to the writer that they were driving on 35th Avenue (Lateral #15) outside Phoenix, Arizona, at about 2100 hours, 30 June 1952, when they suddenly became aware of a light of unusual brilliance about 45° above the horizon and in an easterly direction from their position. Mr. I immediately stopped the car and they both got out to observe the light. Both described it as generally round in shape, apparently very far away and emitting a strange white light of unusual brilliance. Mr. Westated that he has done a great deal of welding and compared the light to that made by a welding torch. After getting out of the car they observed the light for a period of five (5) to eight (3) seconds. As they watched, the object traveled downward, arching slightly to the right, traveling very fast, and leaving no trail. It suddenly blinked out, then reappeared near the horizon, then traveled upward at an extremely high rate of speed. After two (2) or three (3) seconds, it suddenly flashed out again, then appeared about 45° above the horizon. Both Mr. and Mrs. The agreed that the object appeared to be at least several miles away and traveled much faster than any known aircraft. Mr. tated it appeared to be as large as a full moon. His wife described it as being larger than any star, but some smaller than a full moon. Both stated they were startled and were not sure of the total length of time they observed the object, but believe they could actually see it for about thirty (30) seconds. Wes owner and manager of the Arizona, and he and Mrs. Tare apparently of average intelligence. Mr. and Mrs. T also stated that the object they sighted made no audible sound.
  - 3. No other reports conciding with this sighting have been received by this District and this case is considered closed.

1. The following was received from the 18th OSI District (IG), Cheli AF Specialized Depot, Maywood, California, and is forwarded for your information:

"On 1 July 1952, Mr. F residing at California, telephonically advised an agent of this District-Office that on 30 June 1952, at approximately 2200 hours, he was standing approximately 40 feet from his house which faces South near the beach and observed a 'thing' which looked like a meteor. It originated from the South, headed North and came in towards the shore in a descending and easterly turning motion changing directions from a level flight to paralleling the coast toward Santa Monica. stated he observed the sighting for 1-1/2 to 2 minutes. He described the object as spherical or round, generally white with a bluish haze and inclosed by a yellow flame. He did not estimate its speed. He states that his wife also observed this object, and he estimated its size to be approximately one-third the size of a full moon and added that he has not given this information to any newspaper or any other individual. Mr. identified himself as a Special Agent of the Treasury Department, Los Angeles, California."



## FIREBALL OF 1952 JUNE 28 A.M.S. No. 2363 E. A. HALBACH and C. P. OLIVIER

... approximately 10:57 p.m., C.S.T. n this date a fine fireball, which evi-...ly began southeast of Milwaukee, passed to the east of the city and ended over central Wisconsin. E. A. Halbach of Milwaukee promptly requested reports through the press. Of the nundred or more received, the better ones were followed up by him, some by personal interviews. Several years later, he accided to turn over the data on this and several 1952 firebills to the writer for possible solution. ... often happens, the majority of the reports came from Milwaukee and its suburbs. Three from Michigan, which if coordinates had been given would be the key ones for a solution, are almost useless. The same remark applies to most of those from central Wisconsin. A contributing factor to uncertainty was that the northern sky for many observers had cloud masses present. There are also some l'at contradictions in what would otherwise appear good reports. Hence it has been impossible from the data in my hands to derive a path in which one can have great confidence.

The object had a definite disk, estimates averaging perhaps one half the Moon's diameter. That it had a disk is

mentioned by 20 observers. The color was evidently blue-green, the large majority of the 44 reporting color giving one or the other or both. The shortlived trail was orange or red. No long enduring train was left. The duration, leaving out one 30 sec. estimate, was 4.72 sec.; 9 observers. The path sloped downward, the average of 14 estimates being 10°. Apparently sounds were absent. The usual diagram was prepared showing the observed azimuths of points on path where it was first and last seen. Most of those from Milwaukee simply radiate out into the E to N quadrant. Adding the few from other points, and all the "directions of motion" given, the concensus is that the fireball ended more or less NNW from Milwaukee, certainly passed east of the city at a low altitude, and must have started in the southeast. A projected path was then chosen and on basis of altitudes points were computed for the path. No amount of manipulation permits drawing a path which fits all the data. A final compromise was decided on for which the radiant's azimuth is believed correct to ±8° and altitude to ±4°. It is most disappointing that a better result cannot be derived.
