On the 20th of July 1952, at 2227 CST, Mr. Scott, GOC at Elgin, Illinois, 434 Park St., Elgin, Illinois, 1265-R, reported sighting a bright yellowish light moving east to west at a very high rate of speed. Altitude estimated to be 4,500 feet and speed at two (2) miles in five (5) seconds. There was no sound. Light came to a sudden stop and continued burning for approximately ten (10) seconds before disappearing. There were no targets on the scope in this area at time of sighting.

Sky condition was clear to scattered clouds, visibility ten (10) miles.

Captain F.J. Radzickinas, Intelligence Officer, conducted a check at the Yerkes Observatory on the 22nd of July 1952. There was an Aurora Borealis, which occurred on the 20th of July 1952, at 2100 CST.

Yerkes Observatory reported a meteor 100-300 miles south of Williams Bay, Wisconsin on the 21st of July 1952, at 2243 CST.

Lt. Col. Armstrong, from Chicago GOC, reports that many flying saucer reports coming in from Elgin, Illinois, are aircraft. A very good possibility exists that the report in question may have been jet type aircraft.
