



- l. The object was "stick" or "eigar" shaped with longitudinal axis parallel with horizon. It was reddish in bue. There were three puffs of what could have been smoke, vapor, or clouds a short distance behind it. The object moved west for a short time; then appeared to veer south and disappear. This object is very plain and visible while it is still daylight. It was definitely not a plane of any kind. The object can best be described as a brightly burning object, quite high, too close and too large to be a star of any kind, and moving from East to West. It was very bright and visible, with definite outline and shape.
- 2. Object was sighted between 1900 and 1930 hours, Central Standard Time, 14 September 1952, and was under observation for approximately 30 to 40 minutes. A similar object was sighted in about the same place for about the same length of time about 3 weeks earlier.
 - 3. Object was sighted through "high power" binoculars.
- 4. Observation made from White Lake, South Dakota (43 degrees, 44 minutes North, and 89 degrees, 432 minutes West.) Object sighted a "great" distance west and slightly south of observer. Observer could make no estimate of distance involved.
- 5. Observer, Mr. Mr. is an in the town of White Lake, South Dekete, and a Director of the Manual Common Corps. In view of these facts and that Mr. Specifically requested no publicity be given to him personally, it is felt the information can be considered reliable.
 - 6. He westher information was reported.
- 7. It should be pointed out that this observation was made in an area where prior sightings of weather ballooms have occurred. However, Mr. and stated it did not seem to be a balloom even though the distance at which the object was nighted procluded the possibility of observing my structural features of the object.
 - 3. No physical evidence of the object available.
 - 9. No interception or identification action was taken.
 - 10. Location of air traffic in the area at the time is unknown.
