FROM NORTH AT 15 KNOTS CHANGING TO WEST WINDS AT 10 KNOTS AT 10,000 FT. SURFACE WINDS CALM. NO WEATHER OR AIR TRAFFIC IN VICINITY. NO PHYSICAL EVIDENCE.

a later period six additional objects were noted. No vapor trails, exhaust, or sound was noted. This case is carried in the FTD files as being due to balloons, but aircraft seems a much more likely solution in view of the reported speed and maneuvers.

7. At Patrick AFB, Florida, on 18 July 1952, six separate observations of five different series of objects, described as lights, were reported. The initial object which set off the series of observations was a rawinsonde balloon released from a point two miles south of the observer. Following this report were others describing various lights which were observed for short periods of time, usually about 10 seconds, traveling at tremendous speeds in horizontal flights without maneuvers. These lights appeared in varying numbers. These lights are unidentified, but it is probable that they were mirages.

8. There is no case in the FTD files from any AC & W site in Michigan during the month of July 1952.

9. At Goose Bay, Labrador, on 15 December 1952, pilots of a F-33 and a F-94-B attempted, without success, to close on a bright object. The object was identified as an astronomical body.

10. There is no case in the FTD files from northern Michigan on 24 November 1951.

11. There were three cases from Japan on 29 December 1952:

a. At Chitose at 1850-2000 hours a pilot attempted to close on Jupiter.

b. At Misawa a pilot reported a UFO which was determined to have been due to the misidentification of an astronomical body.

c. At 1948-2005 there was an aerial observation of an unidentified flying object which was determined to be Venus.

12. There is no case in the FTD files from Japan on 19 April 1952.

13. On 26 September 1952 in the Azores members of an aircrew observed two lights for over an hour. These lights fluctuated in color and brightness. They were about 20° apart in azimuth and maintained their relationship to each other throughout the sighting. This case is carried as unidentified, but in all probability the sighting was due to the misidentification of distant lights on surface vessels.

14. UFO reported from Truk Atoll and identified as a C-47.

15. There is no case in the FTD files from Korea on 7 February 1953.

I would like to know without any complications in your work, if I could have the following information on these Flying Saucer Sighting cases. The Laredo Air Force Base, Tex., December 24, 1948; also the Uvalde, Tex. case on July 22, 1949; and the cases on the sightings at Laredo Air Force Base, Calif., on Feb. 23, 1950; and the Hamilton Air Force Base, Calif., Aug. 6, 1950; in the south the cases or rather reports Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., on July 18, 1950; in the north the ones at Coos Bay Air Force Base, Oregon on Dec. 13, 1947; at Everett and Wainwright Station in Alaska on April 29, 1950; and at Fairbanks in the area of Fortness Mountain on Nov. 21, 1950; and the foreign sightings at Japan on March 27, 1950; and on April 2, 1950; in the Azores on Sept. 26, 1950; the Lake Mead sighting on Feb. 21, 1950; the Korean one, November 22, 1950; the Mexican one, May 22, 1950; the Canadian one, June 11, 1950; and the New Zealand one, August 1, 1950. I am very much convinced by my history research that they are real. Thank you very much.
