FOLLOWING FLYCERPT RECEIVED BY TELEPHONE FROM
THE OBSERVER, LT COL W G BOLENSTEIN, FLYING
SECTION, OPERATIONAL COMMITMENTS DIVISION,
BGS/O, HQS USAF. TIME OF SIGHTING: ABOUT
0445 EDT, 24 JUNE 53. LOCATION OF OBSERVER:
ON A COAST GUARD COMMUNICATIONS TRUCK AT THE
ANNAPOLIS YACHT CLUB, ANNAPOLIS, MD. TWO
OTHER WITNESSES PRESENT, ONE A CIVILIAN AND
ONE AN ENLISTED MAN IN THE COAST GUARD.
THE OBJECT WAS A WHITE LIGHT, SWAYING SLIGHTLY
WHICH FIRST APPEARED ON THE HORIZON IN A NE
DIRECTION AND THEN CLIMBED SLOWLY IN THE SKY
TRAVERSING AN ARC TO THE DE. ITS MAXIMUM
ANGLE ABOVE THE HORIZONTAL WAS 75-80 DEGREES,
AT WHICH TIME IT SEEMED TO SLOW DOWN AND CHANGE
DIRECTION TO THE EAST. THE SPEED OF THE
OBJECT DID NOT APPEAR CONSTANT AND WAS
RATHER SLOW, BUT FASTER THAN ONE WOULD EXPECT
FROM A BALLOON. SURFACE WIND WAS 10-12 MPH
FROM THE NE. THE OBSERVER PERSONALLY FELT
THAT WHAT HE SAW WAS A BALLOON.
