"I stepped outside at 1:30 AM. and immediately saw a very brilliant light directly east and about half-way up the horizon. This seemed to be quite close. I might compare the intensity of this light to the headlight of a car, but it looked more like a flare than a beam. It moved rapidly, but not exceedingly fast, to the south about 40 degrees, dipping and weaving slightly from side to side, hovered a few seconds, made a large circle then moved slightly higher and north to a point a little short of where I first saw it. This took about 45 seconds. It then circled and hovered there for about ten minutes before gradually receding and dimming out.

"From the way it circled and hesitated during its flight it gave the impression that it was looking for something such as a guiding beam, or, say, a line of magnetic force". Mr. [REDACTED]

EDITORS NOTE: The direction described with reference to Grants Pass, Oregon, would place the object directly above or close to the Oregon Vortex, a well known magnetic fault.

Time: 12/0600-0610Z Sep 1953

Location: Object observed in a northeasterly direction from Hq 2d Army, Ft Meade, Md., in the direction of Laurel, Md. (about 1 or 2 miles from Ft. Meade).

Altitude: Estimated 5-6000 feet

Direction: Moving from NE to N very swiftly, zig-zagging, rising rapidly, stopping, and then moving off rapidly again.

Description: Single golden light similar to a star and about four (4) times as large. Disappeared for 2-3 seconds then reappeared.

Speed: Faster than any known a/c and very maneuverable.

Source: Two (2) EM from Ft. Meade can be contacted thru G-2, 2d Army.

Comments: 2d Army evaluation F-2. Andrews AFB was contacted and had also observed the phenomena at approximately the same time and same place. No radar contact was established.
