

4. At 1430 hours Mr. and Mr. and Mr. interslewed by Special Agent RUSH at Air Traffic Control Center, Stapleton Field, Denver, Colorado. In and and advised they had been watching a B-36 type aircraft making passes over the Denver area at what they judged to be 30,000 feet. The B-36 disappeared behind some clouds and in attempting to resight the B-36 observed 4 or 5 shining specks at what they believed to be approximately 50,000 feet. both advised that the objects appeared to be triangular in shape and that they appeared to be capable of howering in one spot for some period of time and them moving off at a normal rate of speed in a Northeasterly direction. The only thing unusual they observed about the objects were what appeared to be their ability to hover in one place for extended periods of time. observed the objects for approximately 35 minutes and them called the Flight Service Center at Lowry Air Force Base. Neither Drive observed any unusual rates of speed during their observation of these objects.

6. Information has reached this office to the effect that Operation CHECK POINT are having some maneuvers in this vicinity and that various air bases in this vicinity have either no knowledge or very limited knowledge of aircraft participating in the operation. At approximately 2000 hours on 9 July 1954 a local radio station advised during a news broadcast that Operation CHECK POINT was being held in this vicinity and that F-86 type aircraft was repelling the attack at exceptionally high altitude.

1. At 1320 hours on 9 July 1954 this office received a telephonic communication from Captain. Operations Officer, Flight Service, Lowry Air Force Base, Colorado, advising that between 1300 and 1310 hours he had observed 6 or 7 objects flying at a very high altitude and rate of speed and that he did not believe the objects were conventional type aircraft.

- 2. Special Agent EDWARD L. RUSH and M. L. McNABB conducted interviews with personnel of the 3933rd Radar Bomb Squadron (Detachment 3), who advised that at about 1300 hours on 9 July a B-36 aircraft was in the vicinity of Lowry Air Force Base flying at an altitude of approximately 30,000 feet and was working a radar and radio jamming problem. All personnel interviewed advised that no unusual formations or objects had been sighted on the radar scopes at that time. However, the jamming devises being used by the B-36 aircraft were very effective.
- 3. Special Agents McMABB and RUSH interviewed Captain approximately 1345 hours 9 July 1954 and obtained the following information. At approximately 1300 hours on 9 July 1954 Captain was telephonically contacted by Mr. House Flight Dispatcher, United Air Lines, Stapleton Field, Denver, Colorado, who stated that he and Manager By Flight Dispatcher, United Air Lines, had been observing several objects flying at a very high altitude and requested that GERMAN also make some observations. Immediately proceeded out of his office and from the ramp in front of Operations Building, observed 6 or 7 objects overhead which appeared to be approximately one half inch in diameter, 3 or 4 of which were in some semblance of formation and were moving in a Northeasterly direction above a cirrus

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
