At first it was an intense white light, later turned to a pure yellow, then to orange, then to pink, and finally a dark pink.</li> <li>(d) Number - One.</li> <li>(e) Formation - N/A.</li> <li>(f) No discernible features or details noted.</li> <li>(g) No tail, trail, or exhaust noted.</li> <li>(h) No sound heard.</li> <li>(i) During the time object was observed (approximately 5 minutes), it went through four or five cycles of growing in intensity until a peak was reached, and then subsiding to a dall color. When first observed, the object gave off an intense white light which changed to a yellow and then to pink and finally, just before it disappeared, to a dark pink.
