COMMENTS OF PREPARING OFFICER:

- 1. The opinion of the preparing officer is that the sighting was probably caused by the Sandpoint NAS weather balloon for the following reasons:
- a. The duration of the sighting, one hour, propoints out that the object was not self propellant, and no aircraft were reported in the air, including helicopters.
- b. The balloon released at 0831Z with the prevailing winds from 140-270 degrees would project the balloon in the general direction of Poulsbo, Washington.
- c. The wind variations in velocity and direction at various altitudes would create an appearance of bouncing of the object as SOURCE reported.
- d. The balloon was reported to have been aloft for one hour and thirty minutes which would cover the duration of the sighting.
