II. RELIABILITY: The four men who made the observation discussed in this report gave almost identical stories. Since the observation was made from a common point and under conditions exactly alike, the four men have been treated as one composite source. All four are inmates of SOLEDAD STATE PRISON, assigned to the Honor Barracks of the prison, which is located three quarters of a mile from the main prison compound. Inmates assigned to this section are those who have committed lesser criminal offenses and who have a record of good behavior in the prison. They are used by assigned duty on the prison farm. SCURCES volunteered for work with the prison GOC, and were selected on the basis of their prison records. They appeared conscientious and very interested in GOC work and aware of the responsibility involved. They have been commended for their excellent work by their GOC Sector Sgt, M/SGT M. H. GUTHERIE, Det 1, Sector 4, GOC, SALINAS, CALIFORNIA, and are very proud of this recognition. During the interview, SOURCES tried to be precise and exact in answering questions. In the opinion of the investigator, SURCES are considered reliable observers and reporters. No attempt has been made to assess their reliability in any other aspect.

III. SOURCES' DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: Team 1 was at the observation post, SOLEDAD STATE PRISON on the 2400 - 0400 shift. At 010915Z NOV 55, they observed an object rising slowly from behind the mountains in the east. The object appeared to be solid, spherical, bright white, and the size of a silver dollar held at arms length. Almost immediately after this was sighted, SOURCES observed approximately one inch below, a smaller object, which they described as oval in shape, bluish in color, and the size of a half dollar held at arms length. (Refer to Incl #1 for Sketch.) Both objects appeared to be one cohesive unit, always moving simultaneously and at the same rate of speed. At 010917Z NOV 55, team 1 reported the sighting to the OAKLAND FILTER CENTER.

The objects initially appeared to rise at an angle of 45° from the eastern horizon, then slowly, at a speed estimated between 1 and 2 MPH, moved in a southeasterly direction. It was estimated at 90° from T. North. Objects were still visible in the southeast at Oll230Z NOV 55, when team 1 was relieved by team 2. The objects had by this time climbed to an angle of approx 90° from the horizon, and were at approx 135° from T. North.

Team 2 eatched the objects move slowly from the southeast to the southwest where they disappeared behind the mountain range in the southwest at 011345Z NOV 55.

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It was a bright moonlight night, cold, dry, windless and cloudless, with many stars visible. The objects did not apprear to change in shape, but appeared alternately clear and then blurred. Objects appeared to be stationary at times; occasionally, the smaller object was abscured, drawing closer to the larger object, and then dropping down to its original position. There was no sound from the objects. Objects sometimes, but not always, appeared as the color of fire (yellow, orange, red and blue,) when viewed through binoculars (7 X 50) several times within each hour of observation.

None of the SOURCES wear spectacles, and all observations were made from an unobstructed, unenclosed platform.

### SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- 1. A check with the Combat Operations Center, 28th Air Division (Def), Hamilton AFB, Calif (DJNJ 2904) revealed that the AC & W site near SOLEDAD, CALIFORNIA (DJPG 4126) had reported negative contact during the period in question.
- 2. The CAA Weather Station at SALINAS, CALIFORNIA, (DJPG 2041), stated there was no unusual weather phenomena that might account for the sightings.
- 3. Contact was made with the LICK OBSERVATORY, located on 4,380 ft. MT. HAMILTON (DJPH 2320), approximately 50 air miles north of the SOLEDAD UFOB sighting. Dr. Jeffers, astronomer and member of the staff at LICK OBSERVATORY, made the following observations: At the time of the sighting, the planet Sirius was visible high in the southeastern sky, but it was not exceptionally bright, nor likely to be mistaken for a UFOB. Mercury was not visible until just before sunrise, and definitely ruled away the possibility that it might have been Venus. The planet Jupiter rose at approximately 2400 hrs, and was bright, white in color. The planet Mars rose at approximately 0200 hrs, farther to the East than Jupiter, and was described as red-yellow in color. There were no other unusual astronomical phenomena seen from the observatory on the morning in question.
- 4. Major MICHAEL S. KRETOW, Officer In Charge, Project Moby Dick, VERNALIS, CALIFORNIA, (DJPH 4238) was contacted. He stated that no launching operations took place on the morning in question. Launchings occurred on 2, 4 and 5 Nov 55, but all releases were recovered.

COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

1. In the opinion of the Preparing Officer, this sighting was probably caused by the planet Jupiter for the following reasons:

- a. No other identification criteria are consonant with the reported facts of the sighting.
- b. The planet Jupiter, bright and white in color, rose at approximately 2400 hrs on 31 Oct 55, and in the approximate location of the reported sighting. Although the reported shape and size are unusual, for a planet, I believe the SOURCES are mistaken in their report of these two aspects. The direction of movement (East to West), the rainbow variations in color, and the duration of the sighting all lend credence to the planet hypothesis.
- c. Although the SOURCES claimed to have seen two objects, the fact that the distance which separated the two objects varied, and at times almost merged, plus the fact that the two objects always seemed to form a single unit, is believed to have been an optical illusion.
