II. RELIABILITY: Because of lack of conflict with reports of other informant, Source may be considered fairly reliably.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: At approximately 16/18002 Apr 56. Source's CWO Jim Morris (See Part II) asked Source to come to Netional Guard Armory at Fitzgerald, Ga. (GJGB 4543) to observe an object which appeared to be hovering approximately overhead. It was located about helf way between the sun and the moon at 16/1815Z. It appeared motionless and when observed through binoculars (Army M-1 Type), it gave off a glare which made shape determination difficult. It could have round or oblong. It was visible with the naked eye, and "shined like a ster"

Object was observed periodically throughout the afternoon and appeared to be moving in a westwardly direction. At sundown it was at elevation 45 degrees due west. After dark it appeared as a bright star.

Between 16/1930Z and 16/2000%, Sources observed two aircraft at high altitude (one higher than the other) (Confirmed see Part II). Object appeared to be much higher than either sircraft.

- 1. A check with D/I 35th AIRDIV disclosed that Source reported sighting to filter center at Maxwell AFB which, in turn, forwarded the report to GOC 35th AIRDIV.
 - 2. 35th AIRDIV Weather furnished the following data for time of sighting:

- 5. A visit with Dr. Calder of the Bradley Observatory, Decatur, Georgia disclosed that the route taken by the object strongly indicates that it was Venus which is visible during daylight hours during this time of the year. Indecision of Sources as to the shape of the object can be attributed to the fact that Venus now appears as a halfmoon. Venus was personally observed by the investigator through a 185% telescope.
- 6. CWO Jim Morris, administrator for National Guard Armory, Fitzgerald, Georgia, was contacted by phone. His report concurred in all respects with that submitted by Source.

COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

- 1. In the opinion of the Preparing Officer, this sighting was probably caused by the planet Venus for the following reasons:
- a. The description, location of the object, height, and length of time observed indicated the Source was viewing the planet Venus.
- b. Doctor Calder, Professor of Physics and Astronomy, and Director of Bradley Observatory, Agnes Scott College, Decatur, Georgia, verified the opinion of the Preparing Officer.

Concur with the opinion of the Preparing Officer that this sighting was astronomical in nature. Due to the westwardly flight path of the object, the duration of the sighting, and the correlation of the flight path of the object as compared to the path of Venus, it is the opinion of this headquarters that this sighting was definitely caused by the planet Venus.
