

- 1. SYNOPSIS: On 4 September 1956, at approximately 2260 hours, reported seeing an unidentified flying object while observing stars from his home at 11215 Snow Road, Parma Heights, Ohio. Object, according to was star shaped, blinked off and on in several colors, and remained stationary in sky for entire five (5) minutes it was under observation.
- 2. DETAILS: On 5 September 1956

UNCLASSIFIED he is the self appointed president of this organization and that w of allend Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, is Chief Investigator. stated that he could not recall the names of the others present at the meeting which took place at his home on 22 August 1956, but that he had a list of them at home. I stated that he had received approximately fif ty (50) telephone calls and letters in answer to his letter to the editor. stated that the purpose of this organization is to discuss unidentified flying objects and to interview persons who have sighted unidentified flying objects. In connection with this BITTEL stated that on 4 September 1956 be had interviewed a Mrs. Cleveland Heights, Ohio, telephone number to regarding an unidentified flying object she sighted. The stated that Mrs. related to him that between 0400 and 0430 on 28 July 1956 she sighted a spherzual object of redish white color, "hovering up and down" beside the moon, and that there was no sound. The dad no further information regarding Mrs Mrs and sighting. Stated that he had approximately twenty (20) or thirty (30) reports of sightings of unidentified flying objects. further stated that the sighting on 4 September 1956 was the first time he has ever seen an unidentified flying object.

7. BITTEL stated that he had seen the motion picture 'Unidentified Flying Object' in May or June of 1956 at the Stillman Theater, fifteen (15) or sixteen (16) times. Stated that he lives with his mother and step-father. (he was not sure of the spelling of his step-father's last name although his mother has been married to the step-father for three (3) spars.)

9. ACTION: No other similar reports relative to this matter are received. No further action is contemplated relative to the report received.

- 1. Existence of physical evidence, such as materials and photographs: None.
- Noodland Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, called him (man) and reported the following to the Approximately 2215 hours, 4 September 1956, that sighted two (2) lights flying together at 800 to 900 MPH and that they were white in color. If further stated that these lights were 100 to 200 feet apart, the size of a star, circular in shape and made no sound and that the unidentified flying objects were flying East. It stated that the widentified flying objects were flying seen these unidentified flying objects from the front porch of his home at Woodland Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio. If further related that stated that at 2235 hours, 4 September 1956, that he sighted an unidentified flying object about three-quarters of the size of Mars, circular in shape, with a blinking red glow, traveling East at an estimated 900 MPH and that there was no sound. Trelated that the stated it could possibly be a jet aircraft.
 - 4. As a stated that at 2305 hours, 4 September 1956. As a scalled again and stated he saw two (2) unidentified flying objects coming from Southwest (no further detail). As stated that he went out side but could not see these objects that further stated that the object that he had seen at 2200 hours had disappeared from the West and that it was now Northeast of his location and that it was moving back and forth.
 - 5. Stated that he has had an interest in unidentified flying objects for approximately three (3) years and that he has read
 the following books on the subject of unidentified flying objects:
 - "Flying Saucers On Attack" by WILKING
 - Report On Wo. by Captain RUPPELT
 - "Flying Saucers From Mars" by CEDRIC ALLINGHAM
 - 'Flying Caucer Conspiracy' by Major DONALD KEY HOE, USMCR

In addition the stated that he has read articles in the following magazines 'The Little Listing Post' published in Washington, D. C., 'Saucerian' by GRAY BARKER, formerly with the International Flying Saucer Bureau of Bridgeport, Connecticut. Added that Added that Added was formerly director of the International Flying Saucer Bureau.

6. Cleveland Press on 21 August 1956, he solicited others who were interested in unidentified flying objects to form a club. Further stated that this club which is known as the Northern Ohio UFO Research Council has had one (1) meeting at which approximately fifteen (15) persons were present. stated that during this first meeting the discussion centered around explanation for the sighting of unidentified flying objects.
