Inclosed is an unidentified flying object report. Observation of UFOB was by Mr. and Mrs. and Mrs. and Mrs. The observation took place at Kettery, Maine, on 14 Feb 57. Mnowledge of UFOB was first brought to the attention of the 100th Bomb Wing Intelligence upon receipt of a telephone still from Mr. Atterney at Law, on 9 March 1957.

Feb.14-Laurelton LI-7:10pm-Brilliant, yellow-orange Fireball arcing down-ward to the NE Horizon. 1/4 the size of the Full-Moon.

February 16, 1957. CSI member Yeaman Condict was walking northward in Laurelton,
long Island, at 7:10 p.m., when his attention was attracted by a bright "fireball"
near the northeastern horizon. It was a brilliant incandescent yellow-orange in
color, one-fourth the size of the recently-risen full moon, which was just to its
right. The meteor moved downward and to the observer's right as he faced it, and
"looked as if it were going to hit the ground"; but being somewhat low on the
horizon, it disappeared from view behind buildings after being observed for 2 to
3 seconds. Ur. Condict hurried to the corner, but it had disappeared.

The observation, one of a group of recent local sightings of fireballs and more or less fireball-like objects, is included here in the hope of obtaining corroborating reports for the purpose of triangulation.

- 13. Statements of Observers:
- house taking down her washing. Her attention was attracted first by the light. She then observed for a very short period of time an object described as round, and about the size of a softball surrounded by a very bright emerald green light which illuminated the area around the house. The object seemed to be in the center of this light, and did not seem to be burning in its self. The object passed very quickly and did not have or leave any smell, light, residue, wash or effects other than startling the observer. It appeared to be traveling on a course from north to south, (a compass reading taken of the path described was 215 degrees mag) and seemed to angle down after passing overhead of the observer. It appeared to be just above the tree tops, and did not have a tail as if it were propelled. There was no explosion observed prior to, during, or after the passing of this object. It was a cold, dark night with no wind blowing.
- b. Mr. related he did not observe that which his wife related, with the exception of the light which the object gave off. He observed the light while putting the car in the garage. Mr. searched the wooded area south of the house every evening after he returned from work. On 2 March 57, he discovered, at the northeastern end of a swamp pond, an odd hole in the ice. The hole appeared about fourteen inches in diameter, perfectly round in shape, and "burned" at the edge. This burning was described as looking like it had been cut with an acetylene

cutting torch. The hole edge looked as if it had been edged with fine soft coal. The hole appeared to have been made at an angle, with the object approaching from a northerly direction (a compass reading taken of the path described was 320 degrees mag). The hole was frozen over with clear ice at the time of discovery. Upon crossing another swamp pond adjacent to the northwest of the pond where the hole was observed, Mr. The point what appeared to be a band of heat approximately twenty(20) feet wide, running west to east. He entered and left this bank of heat three times. The dogs appeared to be unhappy and whined and whimpered several times within the band of heat. They refused to accompany him when he returned to the band of heat the third time. On 3 March 57, Mr and his son returned to the hole in the ice and upon close observation they noticed an object on the bottom of the pond. The object appeared to be brown in color and approximately six (6) inches in diameter. Its edges were ragged and was curved as a portion of a ball. A geiger counter gave a background reading of 20 beats in the area away from the hole, and a reading of 50 to 70 beats directly over the hole. Mr. stated that his TV set had very poor reception since the passing of the object.

15. On 13 March 57, the investigation team again visited the pond where the object supposedly fell. This time the team was equipped with 1 geiger counter and 1 ion chamber. The pond and the surrounding area for 50 yards was thoroughly probed. The highest reading recorded on the geiger counter was 1/100 of a roentgen. The ion chamber reading was negative. It is the opinion of the investigating team that Mrs. Is sincere and convinced that she did see a bright green lighted object passover the top of her house and disappear behind the trees. Mr Is sincere and convinced that he saw the bright flash of light in the sky at approximately the same time that Mrs. Saw the green lighted object. Bearing in mind that our investigation took place 30 days after the sightling, Mr. Se story of the peculiar hole in the ice, and the band of heat is completely unfounded by the result of our preliminary investigation.
