1. Reference your message AFCIN-4E4- 5-861-E, a negative report is submitted from this detachment for date and time mentioned.

2. For information, at 0215Z, 2 Apr 58, this detachment received a telephone call from a Mrs. [REDACTED] who reported she observed "a green flare [REDACTED] and that she believed it was over Miami Beach. She could not estimate the altitude or distance from her. The telephone connection was severed by her before additional information could be developed.

3. At 0230Z, 2 Apr 58, the above information was relayed to Control Tower, Miami International Airport, where Mr. [REDACTED] Tower Watch Supervisor, advised that he saw what appeared to be a falling star in the East, approximately 30 minutes earlier. It was in view for about one second only and was just above the horizon when he saw it. He could furnish no additional information, inasmuch as he did not rate it as a very unusual occurrence.
