k. Staff Intelligence Officer 99th Bomb Wing, Major Robert F. Nelson. This report is supplementing 9900I message 5932 Dated 02/14452. It is doubtful if any connection exists between this sighting and the aircrew, ACEM sighting; However the proximity of times and locale of observation warranted at least a cursory investigation. Mr at his home at 1930 hrs 1 Oct 1958. During the interview he produced a sketch he made of the object after arriving home within 15 minutes of the sighting. He stated that he at first thought it was a jet aircraft in trouble and this prompted him to call Westover AFB, Mass; However the telephone operator connected him with the local newspaper, which is how I first became aware of the sighting. Mr by trade, has flown light aircraft, wears thick bifocal glasses and appeared to be a reasonably calm person. He and his wife recalled that while travelling by car through New Mexico in 1949 they had observed a similar object but had not reported it for fear of ridicule through publicity.
