



MEMORANDUM TO DIO-6ND FILES

Subj: Unidentified Flying Object, reporting of

An unidentified flying object, spherical in shape with long "tail" was sighted at 1746Z on 28 October 1958 by one observer aboard the ARD-12 docked at Pier G, U.S. Naval Base, Charleston, South Carolina. This information was furnished the District Intelligence Office, SIXTH Naval District, 30 October 1958 by telephone and later, by personal interview.

The object was observed by Mr. J. Charleston, S.C., a shipyard worker, apparently reliable.

The object was first sighted about 30 degrees above the horizon traveling downward at an angle of about 80 degrees with the horizon at a very high rate of speed. The object appeared to be about the size of a basketball, glowing red in color, and had a blue streak "tail" estimated to be 30 feet long. The observer stated that the leading edge of the object appeared to be uniform and smooth while the trailing edge was rough and irregular. Visual contact with the object was maintained only momentarily.

Observer stated he moved from his position forward of amidships to the stern of the vessel when the object disappeared behind ships docked nearby. Observer was not able to regain visual contact with object. The observer estimated the position of unidentified object to be ESE of his position at a range of approximately two miles.

Several other workers with observer noted a multi-engine U.S. Air Force aircraft circling the vicinity of the sighting for about ten minutes after original sighting.


The weather was clear and sunny, the day of the reported sighting, 28 October 1958. The observer stated that the object was very bright although the weather was clear and sunny.


Mr. also reported that he and his wife had sighted the "missile part" reported to be "tumbling" through space in July 1958 while driving his automobile on a local highway. (This "missile" part" is thought to be USSR Satellite reported to re-entering earth's atmosphere.)

The observer, M. Charleston, S.C. is employed as a leadingman shipfitter at the U.S. Naval Shippard, Charleston, S.C. and presently working aboard the ARD-12, a floating drydock moored at Pier G., U.S. Naval Base, Charleston, S.C.

The observer does not wish his name connected with this sighting in the event it is made public information.

There was no further evidence concerning this sighting of an unidentified flying object.

1. At approximately 1755Z hours, 28 October 1958, T/Sgt 12 and A/10 ce (both of the highth FIS) observed a burning object falling quite rapidly from the sky east of Charleston Air Force Base. These airmen stated they were sitting behind Building S-706 (Administrative Building, highth FIS Area) scanning for a squadron aircraft that was to land on Runway 33, when they first observed what appeared to be a white ball of fire, about the size of a dime, with orange tail, about the length of a standard lead pencil held at arms length. The object was first sighted on an azimuth of 125° and approximate angle of 15°, descending and disappearing on an approximate azimuth of 105° and approximate angle of 10-15°. Object when first seen appeared to burn out then reappeared on the same trajectory briefly before disappearing completely. Total time of observation was 1-3 seconds, no visual aids were used and no aircraft were observed in area at time of sighting.

- 2. A/10 the plant of the help the FIS, reported substantially the same information with the following variation: After first observing the object disappear, he never witnessed the secondary appearance, and although he never checked his watch at the time of the sighting, he believes it was between 1800 and 1900Z hours. C., he observed what appeared to be a burning jet aircraft falling and it appeared to be going to crash. Mr. stated that due to the winding road he could not state definitely what direction he was heading in but felt reasonably sure it was to the east. Subject described object as having the characteristics of a jet aircraft with approximately half of the dark colored fuselage engulfed in flames. He first observed the object to his right, passing in front of his truck and disappearing behind trees to his left, and could give no estimate of the distance involved. Mr. Quick also stated that approximately two hours later he observed smoke rising from a wooded area approximately two miles west of Cross, S. C., and was under the opinion that it would have been in the vicinity of the crashed airplane. Total time of observation was 10-15 seconds. No visual aids were used and no sound was heard.
- 4. A check with the following organizations revealed the following information:
- a. 1608th ATG Operations, Base Operations, CRT Section, 444th FIS Operations, CAFB Control Tower and CAA Traffic Officer: A total of 14 aircraft were airborne in local area, exact positions unknown. No aircrewmen reported unusual sightings and no explanation could be given. The 444th FIS was firing air-to-air rockets 30-50 miles east of Charleston Air Force Base.
