

- I. NO INTERCEPTOR ACTION SINCE NO RADAR CONTACTS WERE MADE J.VERY HIGH-NO BALLOON RELEASES KNOWN TO ACCOUNT FOR THIS
- UPON RECEIVING THE PHONE CALL FROM AIRMAN HUYGE AT 0510Z, THE FOL ACTION WAS INITIATED BY ME IN INVESTIGATING THE SIGHTING: INCREASED RADAR SURVEILLANCE OVER THE AREA IN QUESTION BY OUR SITE AS WELL AS THE TWO ADJACENT RADAR SITES; PHONE CALLS TO MINOT AFB, MINOT FAA, MINNEAPOLIS ARTC, WINNIPEG ARTC, 29AIR DIVISION. IN THE MEANTIME, OBSERVERS WERE PLACED OUTSIDE IN AN EFFORT TO SIGHT THE OBJECT. NO CONTACTS WERE MADE ON THE RADAR. NO EXPLANATION FROM ANY OF THE CENTERS TO ACCOUNT FOR THE OBJECT; NO OTHER REPORTS WERE RECEIVED ALTHOUGH THE MINOT AFB SWITCHBOARD OPERATOR STATED THAT SEVERAL CALLS WERE RECEIVED BY HIM CONCERNING THIS SIGHTING. WITHIN MINUTES AFTER THE SIGHTING WAS CALLED TO ME, I WENT OUTSIDE TO OBSERVE. THE NIGHT WAS VERY CLEAR AND A FULL MOON LIT THE AREA; NEVER-THE-LESS T THE ONLY OBJECT IN THE VICINITY REPORTED WAS AN UNUSUALLY BRIGHT STAR. NO MOVEMENT OFNTHE STAR WAS NOTED DURING MY OBSERVATION LASTING TWENT OR MORE MINUTES. NO KNOWN AIRCRAFT WERE FLYING IN OUR

Analysis and Conclusions: Apparently a large number of people saw the object, but only the impression of one individual was reported. It is doubtful that an object remaining in the imediate area of a radar site could remain undetected for three hours, if it was anywhere near the earth. The object observed was probably the star Vega, a 1st magnitude star, which was in the exact location reported for the UFO. The apparent movement was probably due to warm air and foreign particles in the atmosphere.
