- 2. He appears to be a sound and reliable citizen; a father of an airman stationed in Texas.
- 3. The amateur astronomer, Medical has moved and at present his whereabouts are unknown. Last information available was that he worked in Worcester, Mass., telephone number Plazara This number was called without success. No one knew of him at this number.
- 4. Reference paragraph 2, 1st Ind:
- a. Objects were under constant observation the first one and one-half hours, then Mr. re-entered his store to call Mr. (the amateur astrologer) and his son. Together they observed the four objects the remainder of the stated period.
- b. The main object appeared as large as a dime held at arm's length; while the three smaller objects appeared to be pea-sized. All four objects were round and bright silver or aluminum in color.
- c. The objects maneuvered in approximately a four foot square area from where the observation took place.
- d. From conversation and directions pointed out by Mr. I find that his direction in both elevation and azimuth to be fairly accurate to within 5 degrees.
- 5. Further description of flight path and maneuvers were obtained.
- 6. The larger object would appear to hover with the three smaller objects hanging back in Vee formation. First one would approach, appear to close in, then drop back, then the next would approach in turn. Periodically the large object would dance wildly in the sky and circle back into position then all three smaller objects would back off then attack again, one at a time. Suddenly the larger object shot off at a high rate of speed. In a matter of seconds covering 30 degrees of arc from the northwest toward north and disappeared. 
